Ezra Moores Mackey

Ezra Moores Mackey, age 86, Adrian died Wednesday, August 16, 1972, at the Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario after a short illness.

He was born April 21, 1886 at Bellville, Kansas. He married Minnie Boller, February 19, 1910 at Hill City, Kansas. They were married 62 years.

They moved to the Willamette Valley in 1921 and to Tulelake, California in 1935 and finally to Adrian in 1940. Mackey retired from farming in 1969.

He was initiated into the Millbrook Masonic Lodge in Hill City, Kansas in January 1919. He became past in February and raised in March of 1919. He was initiated in the consistory in 1921 and joined the El Kader Shrine Chapter, Portland, Oregon in 1922. He later transferred to the Hillah Chapter, Ashland, Oregon. He received a 50 year membership in the Blue Lodge in 1970 and consistory in 1971. He would have received his 50-year membership pin in the Shrine next month, September, 1972.

Survivors including his wife are, a son, Gerald E. Mackey of Adrian; a daughter, Mrs. Louise Helton of Pendleton, Oregon; a brother, Samuel E. Mackey of Reno, Nevada; 14 grandchildren, 30 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren. A son, George Mackey, died in 1962.

Services were conducted Saturday, August 19, at the Lienkaemper Chapel in Nyssa by Golden Rule Lodge No. 147. Interment was at the Nyssa Cemetery.

The family suggests that memorials be sent to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, Portland, Oregon.

The mission was to take this message into all the world, to every person so that all may hear and be 'born again' by believing in Jesus Christ and this is the mission of the church today.
