Herb Sez ...

At the present time our national forests are still tied up so that the Sierra Club may complete its study of areas that should be set aside as wilderness. When I say, "tied up," I mean just that "tied up." The National forests are not permitted to place any new areas up for bid to the lumber companies. Until the Sierra Club has had time to study (sic) the areas and these studies could last over a period of time long enough to create havoc in the lumber industry. I know "roads" is a nasty word in the language of the preservationist but some roads must be built even for helicopter logging. To obtain lumber we must go into the forests where the trees are. It is like harvesting any crop, one must go into the field. The building of these roads takes time and lumber companies must plan ahead. This hold order is making it difficult to plan ahead.

Why must we cut any trees at all? The answer should be obvious. We need to start 2,000,000 new homes each year. This figure is not counting the many people who desire a second home for vacations etc. It means that 2,000,000 families are looking for some place to live. When the supply of lumber becomes acute you just can't tell the lumber companies to go ahead and cut. It will take time.

The same rule applies to the power companies you just don't tell them, "We now have a shortage of power. Turn on the juice." It takes 5 to 7 years to build a power plant and mighty few of them are now even in the planning stage.

I digressed from the forests. We now have millions of acres of forest areas set aside as wilderness for about 1% of the population of this country who enjoy absolute solitude. For the other 99% who travel in campers and cars we have a total of about 65,000 acres in campsites and parking areas. Yellowstone park is becoming over crowded. Instead of opening more area for thousands of people they plan on closing more of the park for the few.

If we never had a foot of this country set aside as wilderness we would have millions of acres that would never see a road. This is for two reasons, the areas are too rugged or have no particular value. I wish a road was built into the White Clouds. I would like to see it. I never heard of the place till someone wanted to use it.
