Statement By Gov. McCall On U.S. Senate Candidacy

I said on March 7 that I would not be a candidate for United States Senator in 1972, and I did not seek the Republican nomination in the Oregon primary election.

Since that time there has been speculation by the media--and expression of hope from many, many constituents--that I might become an independent candidate. I added to the speculation by openly voicing some thoughts that continued to weigh on me.

I wish to say today that I am sticking to my statement disavowing my candidacy. The door is firmly shut.

One thought I publicly expressed was my apprehension that we might not get a Legislature in 1973 that would be

responsive to the most obvious need of the people. I said this would be a personal disaster, because a principal reason I gave up a try at the Senate was to remain as Governor to labor for Oregon tax and school finance reform.

An analysis of the situation has eased my concern. The Legislative and Executive branches have had to overcome terribly difficult problems in the past, and we have. I am convinced that we will again find in the 1973 session the progressive attitude that has so often marked Oregon legislatures.

When the issue of an independent candidacy first was broached, I responded that I was keeping the door open par-

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SBA Helps Reduce Crime Losses To Business

"Crime today costs a typical small businessman as much as 5% of his total sales," Vic Goertzen, Management Specialist, Small Business Administration reports.

"Losses stem from many sources," Goertzen related, "including fraud, shoplifting, bad checks, employee theft, pilferage and embezzlement, as well as burglary and robbery. Often businessmen do not even know of losses until the year-end statements show profits much less than budgeted."

The problems are further aggravated, he points out, since many small businessmen do not keep records accurate enough to know the extent of shrinkage, or to learn where losses are occurring.

The businessman has two choices, the SBA representative says. He can either raise his prices and thus be less competitive, or institute corrective controls to hold all losses to a minimum.

To aid businessmen in better crime control, the Federal Agency has produced a series of free pamphlets covering major loss areas. These not only discuss the problem but offer positive measures for control.

Publication titles include Prevention of Retail Theft, Reducing Shoplifting Losses, Outwitting Bad Check Passers, Preventing Burglary and Robbery Losses, and Preventing Employee Pilferage. Other related publications including Finding and Hiring the Right

Employee and Proving Fidelity Losses.

In addition, SBA sponsors and conducts crime clinics where businessmen and employees can discuss methods of better control of crime losses in the community.

IT'S THE LAW

UTILITIES. Utilities subject to state or federal regulation may not increase their rates to consumers unless they can prove that the increases are fully justified and are in line with the government's anti-inflation guidelines.

HOSPITAL

DOCTORS AND DENTISTS. Under price controls, doctors and dentists may not increase their charges except to the extent that their own costs have increased. Even then, they may not put up their charges more than an average of 2.5 percent in one year.
