

carnage According to information for the Department of the Interior, the annual legal kill exceeds 39 million doves. The cripple losses exceeds 26 percent of the bag. This leaves over 11 million broken and pining birds to suffer days, even weeks be-

fore death sets them free. For dormant targets, millions more are killed with arrows, slingshots, BB guns and small rifles, but never picked up. The kicks are in seeing them fall and in just ending a life while the blood
