Franklin Selected

Counselor

Treasure Valley Community College Flight Program Director, Robert Franklin, has been selected as an Accident Prevention Counselor by the Federal Aviation Administration. He will serve pilots of this area in an effort to reduce aircraft accidents through education.

This honor was communicated to Mr. Franklin in a letter from J.H. Prendergast, Chief of the General Aviation District Office in Boise. In it Mr. Prendergast wrote, "We must increase our capacity to educate airmen and reduce hazards to aviation. By appointing a limited number of Accident Prevention Counselors, we are increasing the education potential. Counselors must be knowledgeable of the airmen and aviation environment in their immediate areas. They should also be respected in their aviation communities for their diligence, discretion, integrity and dedication to safety in aviation. They must be ready to give of their own time and talents without remuneration. Counselors, by taking an active interest in this vital program, can certainly improve the aviation image and effect economic growth for their communities."

"Because we believe you meet the above requirements, we have selected you as an Accident Prevention Counselor."

Franklin's duties will include counseling airmen who exhibit unsafe practices; making recommendations to reduce aviation accidents; publicizing Accident Prevention Program activities and accomplishments; assisting in the conducting of local aviation educational seminars and clinics; advising the Accident Prevention Specialist when unable to remedy hazardous situations; and promoting and conducting courtesy proficiency flights.

Sandquist Dinner

Attended By 200

Over 200 friends and associates of Harry Sandquist met August 25 to honor the retiring chief of the local extension office staff. Sandquist and his wife, Bernice, were given several gifts and the long time agent was honored with the presentation of Farm Bureau's Top Hand award.

Those attending the dinner came from the four western states and had known Sandquist and worked with him over the years since his graduation from OSU.

Many paid tribute to Sandquist for his ability to work with people. Presidents of the various commodity groups spoke of the excellent cooperation and assistance given their groups by Sandquist and his staff. Kay Teramura, speaking for the Onion Growers and Fred Deffer for the Potato Growers, said great strides had been made in their industries by proper direction from the chief agent.

Ernie Seuell, president of Malheur County Farm Bureau, said the Top Hand award is only given those who have made a great contribution to agriculture.

Jerry Nibbler, OSU extension staff member at the dinner, noted that Malheur County is one of the biggest in the state and is one of the most important agricultural counties in Oregon. He announced that Sandquist has been awarded the title of Professor Emeritus by Dr. McVicar, president of OSU.

Sandquist's work in Malheur County was traced by fellow local extension agent Bailey who told of the improvements brought into the dairy industry, livestock business, county fairgrounds and his work with the Parma Wool Pool. "It has been a real pleasure to work with 'Hi' through the years," Bailey concluded.

The retiring agent said he had "lots of work yet undone" and would continue at this on his farm across the river in Idaho. He recently sold his Malheur County property.

Sandquist's retirement becomes effective August 31. His replacement is Ray Novotny, Harney County extension agent.
