Toastmistress Club

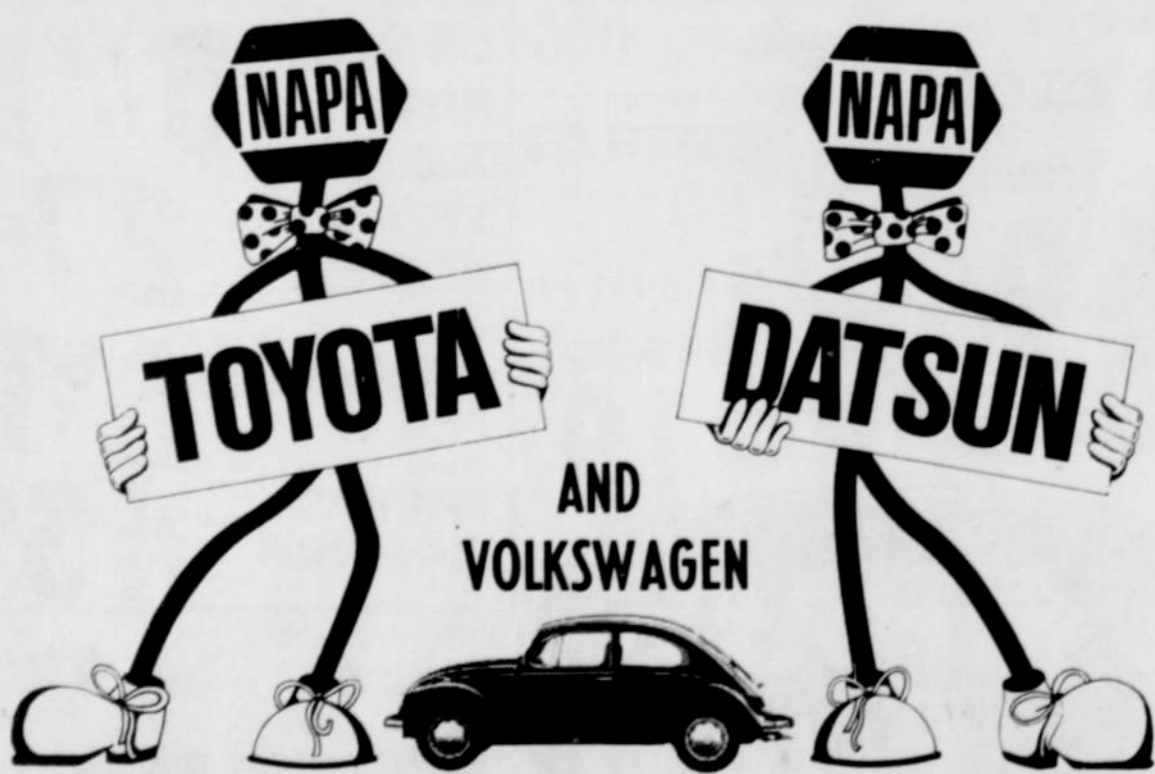
