Nyssa Stage set for Crazy Saturday with the event to feature merchant bargains, free prizes and ridiculous costumes.

Sabin oral polio clinics scheduled Sept. 29-30 for Nyssa, Vale, Ontario and 14 towns of Southwestern Idaho have been rescheduled for Nov. 3-4. The second clinic is set for Dec. 8-9.

The announcement was made Wednesday morning by Dr. Augustus Tanaka, president of Malheur Medical Society, and Dr. David Sarazin, chairman of the drive in Nyssa.

Delay is due to adverse publicity given recently to the type three vaccine and on advice of the U.S. Health Service pending further study of reports of paralytic polio cases in Canada.

Polio took the life of a seven-year old boy and his mother, both of Hines, Oregon, this week to bring to four the number of deaths resulting from polio. All have been patients brought to the Malheur Memorial Hospital from other areas.

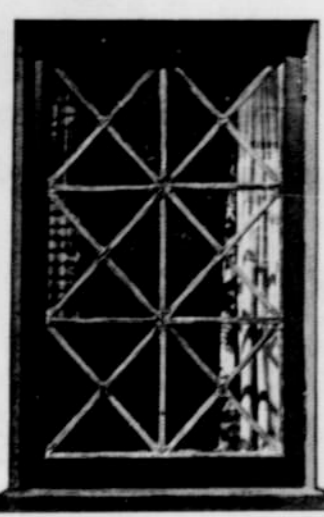
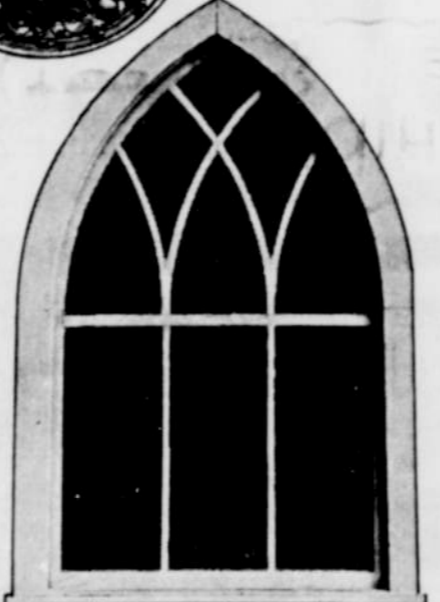
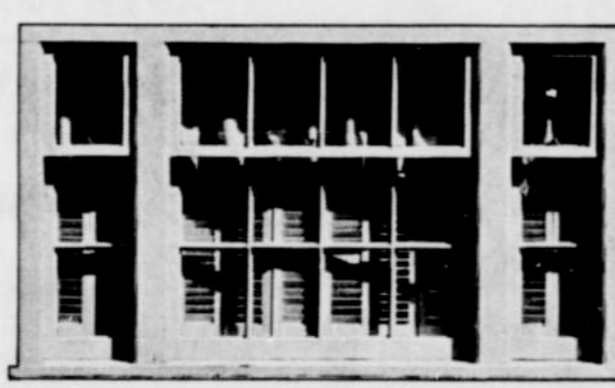
