Favorite Foods

Pancake houses and pancake feeds are popular anytime, but especially this time of the year when we feel the air cooling and a bit of frost here and there.

When you find a pancake recipe like the one I'm featuring this week you'll serve them often because you can store the batter in your refrigerator and use it when you wish, breakfast, brunch or supper.

This recipe came from a pancake house in Portland. Read the ingredients carefully—you'll be amazed to find they contain 4 leavening agents, soda, baking powder, yeast, and eggs. (When I made these on T.V. one of my friends was sure her husband had written the recipe wrong).

With the start of school students need a good breakfast every morning to start the day. Breakfast is their most important meal.

REFRIGERATOR BUTTER-MILK PANCAKES

A stack of fluffy light griddle-cakes, lots of butter and a pitcher of syrup makes any breakfast a special treat.

4 cups buttermilk
2 tbsp soda
2 tsp sugar
1 tsp salt
4 cups flour
2 tsp baking powder
1 pkg dry yeast
1/4 cup salad oil
6 eggs beaten
1 cup cream

Add soda, sugar and salt to buttermilk. Sift baking powder and flour and stir into buttermilk mixture. Add yeast, stir in salad oil and well beaten eggs.

Set in refrigerator overnight. Remove from refrigerator and allow batter to stand at room temperature to activate yeast. Add cream. Bake on hot griddle. (This batter will keep a week or more in your refrigerator and you may use from it as you wish.)

Here are 3 sauces to use with these especially tasty hot-cakes.

STRAWBERRY SAUCE

1/3 cup butter
1 1/2 cups powdered beet sugar
1 1/2 C. crushed strawberries

Have butter at room temperature. In small bowl beat with electric mixer until fluffy. Beat in powdered beet sugar gradually, fold in strawberries. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

MAPLE SYRUP: Combine 1 cup light corn syrup, 1/2 cup brown sugar, and 1/2 cup water; cook and stir till sugar dissolves. Add few drops maple flavoring, 1 tablespoon butter. ORANGE SAUCE: Combine 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup frozen orange-juice concentrate. Bring just to boil; stir occasionally.

And here's a quick, easy way to cook bacon. No fuss, no splatters and the bacon lies flat on the broiler rack.

BACON FOR A CROWD

Bacon for a crowd is quick when you cook it in the oven. Place separated slices on rack in shallow baking pan. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes - no turning, draining. (I use my broiler pan)

Students Must Register For National ACT Tests

Students at Nyssa High School who are planning to attend college will have five opportunities to take the ACT Assessment during the 1972-73 academic year.

The first of five national testing dates on which the national assessment examination will be offered is Saturday morning, October 21. Students planning to take the five-part ACT Assessment on that date must have registered no later than October 2, it was announced by Duane Buchtel, Guidance Counselor.

Buchtel also announced the complete national ACT schedule for the 1972-73 academic year. The schedule is (with corresponding registration periods in parentheses): Oct. 21, 1972 (Aug. 21-Oct. 2); Dec. 9, 1972 (Oct. 9-Nov. 13); Feb. 24, 1973 (Nov. 27-Jan. 29); April 28, 1973 (Feb. 12-April 2); July 21, 1973 (April 16-June 25).

Cost to students for the ACT Assessment, which takes about 3 1/2 hours to complete, is \$6.50. Resulting information reports are of valuable use to students and counselors in college planning.

Last year approximately one million persons in the U. S. and overseas took the five-part examination-questionnaire, which is required or recommended for applicants at more than 2,000 colleges, universities, two-year colleges, scholarship agencies, and athletic conferences.

ROTC Scholarships For Air Force Available

Male high school students who will graduate in 1973 and are interested in flying are eligible to apply for an Air Force ROTC four-year college scholarship.

One thousand four-year college scholarships are available for students who will enroll in the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps at one of the colleges and universities in the United States and Puerto Rico which offer the four-year program.

The scholarships will be awarded to qualified students who agree to become Air Force pilots or navigators after college graduation.

Each scholarship pays full tuition, laboratory fees, and text book reimbursement. In addition, each scholarship student receives a monthly non-taxable subsistence allowance of \$100.

All applicants for a scholarship must qualify on the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test and on an Air Force medical examination. A special committee of Air Force officers will evaluate all students who apply for a scholarship. They will consider the student's scores on the American College Test or the Scholastic Aptitude Test, high school grades, extracurricular activities and personal references.

Interested students must submit their applications posts marked no later than November 15. Application forms, and additional information may be obtained by writing Directorate of Admissions, Air Force ROTC, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama 36112.

"Pitch In" Campaign Fights Litter Problem

Reports from across the Nation indicate that "Pitch In" - a massive litter prevention campaign launched earlier this year - is making progress toward solving the pollution problem of litter.

From Washington to Florida, from Maine to California, it is becoming a "Pitch In" happening as individuals, government agencies, organizations and industries are joining in the important task of ridding our country of litter.

Back of the campaign is the philosophy that litter is one pollution problem that can be solved without costing the taxpayers a single cent. On the contrary, a reduction in the volume of litter will save hundreds of thousands of dollars which now go toward the cost of cleaning up our highways, beaches, and parks.

In addition to backing the program with a \$3 million national advertising budget, the brewers strongly encourage other industries, individuals and organizations to adopt the "Pitch In" theme, and has made available to others all of the promotional materials which carry the "Pitch In" symbol.
