Gov. McCall Appointed To Committee

Governor Tom McCall has been reappointed by President Nixon to a four-year term on the Citizens Advisory Committee on Environmental Quality.

McCall remains as the only governor on the 14-member committee which advises the President's cabinet-level Council on Environmental Quality.

McCall is nationally recognized for his work in the environmental field. He won the Sigma Delta Chi's 1962 award for the "Outstanding TV Documentary in the United States," and last year won the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society's "Medal of the Society" award for his "outstanding contribution in the field of conservation and preservation of our American heritage."

In appointing McCall, Nixon said, "He is one of the strongest conservation-minded governors in the United States. Oregon has been fortunate in having a leader in the fight against air and water pollution. Now that leadership will lend great stature to this critically important national committee."

Survey Shows OSU Students Spend \$23½ Million Annually

Students at Oregon State University spent at least \$23,500,000 last year for non-university goods and services, according to a market survey just released.

Biggest single expenditure was \$3,503,400 for groceries, followed by \$1,717,130 for clothing and \$1,170,140 for sound equipment.

The survey included purchases in 30 major categories, but did not include expenditures for university tuition, books and on-campus housing.

Other major expenditures included \$759,310 for electrical appliances, \$750,744 for dining out, \$733,815 for gifts, \$706,281 for photography equipment and supplies and \$665,830 for bus and airline travel.

The survey was conducted last May by students in an OSU marketing class under the direction of Boris Becker, assistant professor of business and technology. Official enrollment at OSU last spring term was 14,145.

The project was initiated in a journalism course by N. Christian Anderson, editor last year of OSU's student newspaper, The Barometer, to determine total expenditures of Oregon State students in the Corvallis area.

In his analysis of the survey results, Anderson notes that OSU students owned 18,431 transportation vehicles. A total of 7,705 students owned automobiles, 1,964 owned motorcycles and 8,763 owned bicycles.

During the nine-month school year, OSU students purchased 1,813 new and used automobiles, 152 new and used motorcycles and 3,324 new and used bicycles.

The survey did not include spending by the some 4,000 faculty and staff at OSU, Anderson noted.

Other expenditures listed were furniture, \$240,551; flowers, \$89,059; jewelry, \$284,628; recreation, \$394,516; shoe repair, \$44,756; beer and wine purchases from grocery stores, \$92,460; cosmetics and toiletries, \$459,586; pharmaceuticals, \$28,402; and entertainment, \$44,304 per month.

The survey shows that 26,325 students had their hair cut during the academic year and spent \$25,721 at beauty shops. Nearly 9,300 students owned typewriters, 11,331 wore corrective lenses, and 9,216 owned some form of life insurance.

Herb Sez ...

There is a need for the study of ecology and conservation in this country. There should be no place for preservationists who have horned in on the ecologists and conservationists. The preservationist is not interested in the betterment of the ways of living. He wants to maintain the status quo by bringing progress to a screeching halt. The conservationist looks to the future for example, 50 years from now the dredge piles South of Cascade will be a beautiful forest while the Chamberlain Basin will be a worse pile of windfalls than it now is.

It makes no difference if it is a saw mill, powerplant, super highway or irrigation project the preservationist is against it. The ecologist recognizes the need of these projects and tries to keep them as clean as possible.

I would like to know the ultimate aim of the preservationists. Take for example, the Salmon River. Studies are now being made to make this a Wild River. The people of the city of Riggins became alarmed at the possibility of being classified as a scenic area with no possibility for future development. They were told if the area was classified it would probably be to maintain the status quo, but there were no solid assurances. Other uses MAY BE permitted.

O.K. how would this effect New Meadows? New Meadows has possibilities of being a resort center some time in the future. Meadows Valley is on the Little Salmon River, a branch of the Main Salmon. Are tributaries included? I can already see a wilderness study area from my front porch. Other resource uses MAY BE PERMITTED but I wouldn't want to bet on it. Is the ultimate aim to make the Salmon River a vast playground for people who don't have to work in the summertime?

The Sierra Club has registered several complaints against the Jim Bridger power plant North East of Rock Springs Wyoming. I saw this plant the other day and I couldn't help but wonder just how anything could harm the esthetic values of that vast Wyoming desert. I doubt if the jack rabbits and rattle snakes are a vanishing species. If it comes to having power in the West or disturbing the sage brush, I'll take the power. There will always be a million square miles of sagebrush to play in.
