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Oregon BLM Lands

Open To Hunters

Oregon sportsmen may want to stop at a local Bureau of Land Management office as part of their preparations for the upcoming general deer season opening. Over 15 million acres in the state are administered by BLM under the multiple-use principles which allow for hunting in season, says Archie D. Craft, BLM state director. Hunters should be aware that problems can arise by misunderstanding who owns what land. Craft suggests that hunters may contact one of twelve BLM offices throughout the state to secure maps at nominal cost and other information about ownership of the lands on which they wish to hunt.

In addition to maps, a brochure about Recreation Access, prepared jointly by the Oregon State Game Commission and the Izaak Walton League, is available. This publication spells out the rights of the sportsman and the private landowner, concerning access to land for hunting. "We have many areas within the state where there is an intermingled land ownership," says Craft. A map of the area may be helpful to determine the public land which is open to hunting and camping and the land which is privately owned.

Although none of the BLM administered land in the state is closed because of fire danger at this time, sportsmen are advised to be careful with campfires and smoking. Some areas of the state are dry and could burn, says Craft.

Elk Hunt Becomes

\$1,700 Blunder

An illegal elk hunt in which five prime elk were downed in Tillamook County recently by a Portland resident became a \$1,700 blunder on his part when he was found guilty of the offense in a jury trial at Tillamook and fined that amount plus court costs by Judge Marge Christianson of the Tillamook County Court.

Judge Christianson also sentenced the offender to one year in jail, with probation at the end of 60 days, and revoked his hunting privileges for the remainder of the year.

According to Captain Walt Hershey, who heads the game law enforcement division of the State Police, Ralph Bushell, Jr. of Portland was found guilty of the elk killing offense. Apprehended when he and friends were attempting to haul the five animals to Portland, he was cited into the Tillamook court where he requested a jury trial. The jury deliberated for a brief 20 minutes after hearing all testimony in the case. Bushell was fined \$500 for the first elk and \$300 for each of the other four animals.

N. TENMILE YIELDS

TROPHY CATFISH

Want to catch some large brown bullheads? If you do, the Game Commission suggests you give it a go at North Tenmile Lake where these tasty game fish have grown to record size since the chemical treatment several years ago. A recent creel check of two anglers on North Tenmile showed that in ten hours of fishing the two anglers creel 81 brown bullheads, with 61 of these running 12 to 18 inches in length. Sixteen of these ranged from 14 to 16 inches and three reached the 18-inch mark.

No weights were taken of these large bullhead catfish but undoubtedly the larger ones would have tipped the scales at several pounds. All were taken on bait.

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Nyssa Beats Payette, 50-8

The Nyssa Bulldogs put their game together Friday night at the expense of the Payette Pirates, and came out with a big 50-8 victory. The game was marked by excellent running, some fine passing, and hard defensive play on the part of the Bulldogs. It was a satisfying game for Coach Harry McGinley because his troops not only executed, but he had opportunity to give his sophomores and younger players a chance to get in some playing time.

In the first quarter Jerry Wilson broke the ice, taking a 36 yard pass from Dwight Calhoun for 6 points, a pass conversion failed. Then Kevin Engstrom ran 6 yards for a touchdown, and Pat Ross ran for 2 points on the conversion. Darr Haney scooped up a fumble and ran 18 yards to score again, then ran in the 2 point conversion, and the score stood Nyssa 22, Payette 0 at the quarter.

Kevin Engstrom ran 4 yards to score in the second quarter, and Jerry Wilson kicked the conversion. Wilson came back with a 30 yard pass from Cal-

houn, but the kick failed, and Nyssa led 35-0 at half-time.

Darr Haney ran 48 yards for a touchdown in the third period, and the conversion run by Dean Sappe was good for two points. Sappe came back with a one-yard plunge for a touchdown, and Jerry Wilson kicked the conversion. The two conversion kicks by Wilson are the first of their kind most Nyssa fans can clearly remember (a new innovation in football). Payette then scored on a 36-yard pass from Kelpin to Stewart, the two-point conversion was good, and the score was 50-8 to end the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was scoreless as Nyssa reserves got in some playing time.

The Bulldogs played their next game at Middleton Friday evening, September 29.

DIAMOND LAKE BOTTOM LITTERED

If illegal chummers and beer and pop drinkers continue to dump their cans and bottles in Diamond Lake, fishermen at this popular angling spot might well be crowded right off the top of the water. At least the bottom will be so cluttered with debris, anglers will be fishing literally in a garbage dump.

In five small areas inspected recently by Game Commission scuba divers, beer cans and bottles topped the list of debris found, with chum containers second on the list. Broken fishing rods, rusty buckets, and plastic gadgets took third, and unintentional litter such as anchors, sunglasses, and unopened beer cans ranked fourth. No attempt was made to count miscellaneous small litter.

If just the material found in several places in the prime still-fishing area of the lake is expanded to include the total still-fishing area, this 30-acre portion contains debris totaling 480 chum containers and 465 beverage cans and bottles. One area surveyed was out of the still-fishing area, representing mainly that of the trolling and

fly-fishing portion of the lake. If the data from this small area are applied to the remaining 2,963 acres, the bottom of the main body of the lake contains 7,500 chum containers and 44,500 beer and pop cans.

Chumming substances most popular were sardines, tuna, cat food, corn, and cottage cheese. No attempt was made to count litter sunk into the mud but slicing through the sludge with a broken fishing rod uncovered at least one piece of litter per four square feet in one popular still-fishing area.
