About twenty years ago I was talking with an old timer in Meadows Valley and he told me. "Fishin's all shot to hell. There ain't no more fish. Man I can remember when it wasn't nothin' to go out and catch 50 to a hundred fish 'most any afternoon."

In response to this I told "yep, and I'll bet you could kill 10 grouse 3 or 4 times a week." "That's right," he said, then "I wonder how come there's so few around now." I didn't bother to point out the obvious. He would just tell me that he was thinning the flock. It's good for the country, you know, to hold the wild life

Today, if sportsman groups are to be believed, just about everything that abounds in the woods is an endangered species. Several years ago the crocodile became an endangered species and laws were passed prohibiting the killing of the crock. This was a good idea because they were being slaughtered but recently they have been increasing till the state of Florida was afraid they would have crocodiles up to their hip pockets, so it is again legal to reduce the species.

A friend of mine was worrying about the scarcity of deer. I told him one cure for part ning of the trouble would be to not shoot them. In some hazy way I learned that roads were the main cause of the lack of deer and that it was for the good of wild life to thin them out in the fall. I guess I ain't sportsman enough to see this, I enjoy an occasional hunk of venison but I have never carried a gun in the woods aroundhere. Fishing is my fun, I've been out twice this year. I caught a total of 18 fish. Fish are getting a little scarce toward the end of the season. It took me about an hour and a half to catch my legal 10. If I really wanted to increase the fish load in the stream, I should advocate to closing of all streams in the state for a couple or three years. All streams would have to be closed to prevent fishing out those that weren't endangered, but really I don't think the problem is that critical. I like to fish once in awhile.

I hope nobody discovers that species. I could do well without them. I don't suppose the fellow whose brother was eaten by a bear would worry too much about the welfare of bears. It all depends upon your point ning.
