

Watt Watching for Better Heating Efficiency

Regardless of the type of heating system in your home, the following tips can help you conserve electricity and still enjoy all the warm comfort your system is designed to provide.

1. Always make sure that doors to your garage, basement and attic remain closed. Letting heat escape to these parts of the house is simply a waste of energy and money.
2. Check your home's insulation carefully. Poor insulation can increase your heating costs drastically and unnecessarily. An older home, especially, may need new or additional insulating for good heating system operation.
3. Keep heat indoors by sealing areas around doors and

windows where it could escape. If your home has a fireplace, keep the damper closed when it is not in use.

4. Thoroughly examine and clean your heating system each fall. It can save you money in the long-run.
5. A clogged filter not only will make your forced-air system work harder, it prevents the delivery of heat where it's needed. Therefore, it's always a good idea to have your filters checked monthly.
6. Once you set individual room thermostats at your family's lowest comfort level, you should not have to touch them again regardless of variations of outdoor temperatures. In fact, moving thermostats up and down increases your heating costs.

7. Turning your central heating system off at night will just make it work harder in the morning after walls, floors and ceilings have become cold. Night set-back should be no more than 5 to 7 degrees.
8. Storm windows are a good investment. In winter, for example, they are very effective in preventing heat loss... by as much as 15%. Think of how much money you could save in three or four months!
9. On wintry but sunny days, keep your curtains and drapes open. Even a winter sun helps keep your home warm.
10. If you are building or buying a new home, have a heating contractor make sure your heating system is designed for your home's needs. A system that's too large or too small is just an unnecessary expense.

Western Bank Adds Five Branches In Merger

Western Bank, headquartered in Coos Bay, is the resulting bank of a five bank merger, it was announced today by A. W. Sweet, president of Western Bank.

the merger involves Lane County Bank, Florence; the Bank of St. Helens with its branch in Scappoose; the Bank of Klamath County, Klamath Falls, with two offices in that city; the Bank of Central Oregon, Redmond, with its branch in Bend; and Western Bank, Coos Bay, with its twelve offices throughout the state.

Approved by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the resulting bank, with nineteen offices located in all principal areas of Oregon except the Willamette Valley, is known as Western Bank. Total resources exceed \$125 million, and lending capacity is more than doubled.

Joining the board of directors of Western Bank at the time of the merger were George Dugan, owner of George Dugan Chevrolet, Klamath Falls, and president and chairman of the Bank of Klamath County; Jim

Fisher, owner of Joe Fisher Ford and Jim Fisher Motors, Portland, director and vice president of the Bank of St. Helens; and, Berwyn Coyner, president and founder of the Bank of Central Oregon.

While the banks involved in the merger have changed their names to Western Bank, the policies, services and personnel of these institutions have been retained.

Idaho Power Provides

"Growth Country" Film

A new Idaho Power Company motion picture depicting the growth and stability of the Snake River Valley's economy and the utility's construction of service facilities to supply the increasing electric demands of its customers now is available for public viewing.

Prints of the 28-minute, color film, titled "Growth Country," have been distributed to each of the company's division offices at Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Payette, according to advertising director G. L. Stanton.

"Service clubs, schools and other interested groups are invited to arrange for showings of the film through their local Idaho Power offices," he said. Film libraries at Boise State College, College of Southern Idaho and Idaho State University also have been supplied with prints for showing, chiefly in schools in their area.

"Growth Country," tracing the progress of land reclamation in the area, contrasts the more than 1 million acres now under electric-pump irrigation with author Washington Irving's early-day description of the

Snake River Valley as presenting "vast desert tracts that must ever defy cultivation."

Picturing the development of new, light industry as well, the film emphasizes that the Snake River Valley has earned the name "Growth Country" both because of its past and its potential for future progress using a "wealth of natural resources yet untouched."

Among the reasons for the location of new industries in the Snake River Valley, it says, are the area's recreation opportunities, "ample" supply of workers and proximity to markets.

The film also describes Idaho Power's recreation and fish-conservation programs and its construction of such new sources of electricity as the T. E. Roach Hells Canyon development and the Jim Bridger steam generating plant now being built near Rock Springs, Wyoming.

Construction of these and other new facilities, it concludes, enables Idaho Power to continue supplying the electric demands of its growing area.

Concert at TVCC Sunday

These will be played by Shari Rhodes and Robyn Matz, students of Madeline Hsu. A Mozart duet for violin and viola will be performed by Kevin Kircher and Laura Von der Heide.

Admission to the concert will be \$1.00 for adults and 35 cents for students. This charge will be used to pay the expenses for the group to come from Boise and any excess will go to the Treasure Valley Community College music scholarship fund.

Highway 26 Repairs To Be Made Soon

Oregon House Speaker Bob Smith of Burns said today the State Highway Division has promised to speed-up extensive maintenance work on Highway 26 between Vale and Unity.

Smith, who urged the Division to take the action before winter, said the road was reviewed at his request by the Maintenance Engineer and Regional Engineer for Eastern Oregon on September 14.

The review, Smith said, indicated that extensive damage had occurred following last winter. Frost heaves and subsequent breakup were corrected by having a paving plant setup at Brogan Hill, from which 3,600 tons of asphaltic concrete were utilized in patching between Ironside and Brogan.

Smith said the pavement is a thin oil mat, and that breakup has continued to the point that additional work will be required.

To correct the situation,

Smith said the Highway Division plans a second paving plant setup to place the section in satisfactory condition for the coming winter.

Smith said the Division told him that the present condition of the road indicates that it will be necessary to continue extensive patching from Brogan to Unity.

The newly constructed over-lay runs from Brogan to Jamieson.

The remaining section from Jamieson to Vale will be scheduled for an overlay project as soon as possible. The deterioration of this section is such that it is recommended that overlay be used, rather than heavy patching.

Smith said the Highway Division recognizes that this section is substandard to meet today's traffic volumes due to structural design, pavement widths and alignment.

Students Complete C of I Science Training Program

Sixteen Idaho and Oregon high school students have successfully completed the summer Student Science Training Program of the National Science Foundation offered on the College of Idaho campus, according to Dr. Bruce Schatz, director of the C of I program.

The training program, one of 114 funded by NSF throughout the United States, held classes for its second consecutive summer June 19 through July 28, 1972, in the Boone Science Center.

Designed to identify and encourage talented students to become future leaders in meeting the nation's needs in science and technology, the NSF grants totaled 1.8 million for the 1972 year. The C of I grant of \$5572 enabled high school juniors to gain a fuller understanding of chemistry through lectures and work with sophisticated instruments not found in the high school laboratory.

Dr. Schatz and Dr. Franklin Hood of the C of I chemistry department administered the summer lectures and labs, supplementing their work with guest lectures. Dr. Richard Banks of Boise State College introduced the students to the NMR method of instrumentation, and Glen L. Evans, curator of the Evans Gem and Mineral Collection, conducted a tour of the display in Boone Hall. Environmental problems and chemistry were discussed by Donna Parsons, director of the Regional Studies Center. The Boone Hall planetarium, run by Susan Randall, was

opened to the students for a special session.
