Election Laws Not Violated

County Judge Ellis White told the Journal this week that he and members of the County Court have received an answer to Oscar Bratton's allegation that election laws were violated in their support of his opponent. The answer came from Jack F. Thompson, Assistant Secretary of State.

The letter says in part that "our study of the letter reveals there is no violation of any Election Law. Certainly the County Court, speaking as a body, or individually, has a right of free speech and has so exercised that right. It might have been imprudent to have the endorsement on county letterhead, but Local Students that in itself is not a violation of any Election Law."


