COACHES NEVER LOSE

A team can lose. Any team can lose. But in a sense, a coach never loses.

For the job of a coach is over and finished once the starting whistle blows. He knows he's won or lost before play starts.

For a coach has two tasks. The minor one is to teach skills—to teach a boy how to run faster, hit harder, block better, kick farther, jump higher.

The second task, the major task, is to make men out of boys.

It's to teach an attitude of mind. It's to implant character and not simply to impart skills.

It's to teach boys to play fair. This goes without saying. It's to teach them to be humble in victory and proud in defeat. This goes without saying.

But more importantly it's to teach them to live up to their potential no matter what his potential is.

Last summer a vehicle got in the path of another car and Cindy Bratton Cook was killed. Today the man accused of the crime is free on all counts and we don't understand.

The contention was that the accused couldn't control his car in order to avoid hitting a slower moving car ahead of him; as a result he bounced into the path of Cindy's car and was not trying to pass the car. We thought a driver had to drive in such a manner he had car under control at all times. We don't understand.

The car didn't get on the wrong side of the road by itself and it is evident Cindy did not kill herself. It appears to us that some one did not do their home work and it wasn't the defense. At one point it is said the accused admitted to the officer that he was the driver but through a legal technicality this could not be admitted as evidence. Perhaps the D. A. doesn't have to work as hard on a case because he has a job anyway. We think now the prosecution will shrug his shoulders and say there is nothing more he can do. At this point he is probably right. We think he was out smarted.

It also couldn't be proved that the accused had run away from the scene of an accident, although he wasn't present when the police wanted to question him further. We just don't understand. This we know, a loved one was taken from us and if we had been a party to this trial, we wouldn't rest easily knowing THAT JUSTICE DID NOT PREVAIL.

She was preceded in death by her parents Mr. and Mrs. George Phillips, pioneer residents of this area; two sisters, Mrs. Myrtle Cowens, and Mrs. Josie Thomason; three brothers, Herbert, Frank and Jimmy Phillips.

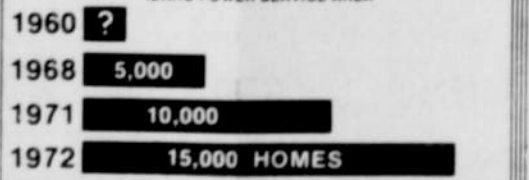
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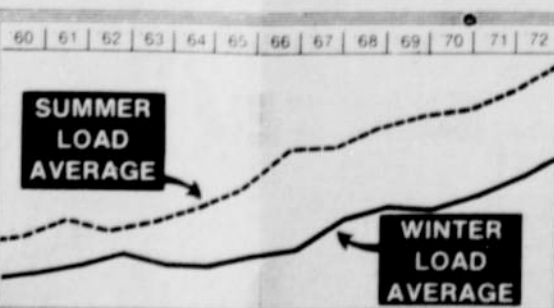
