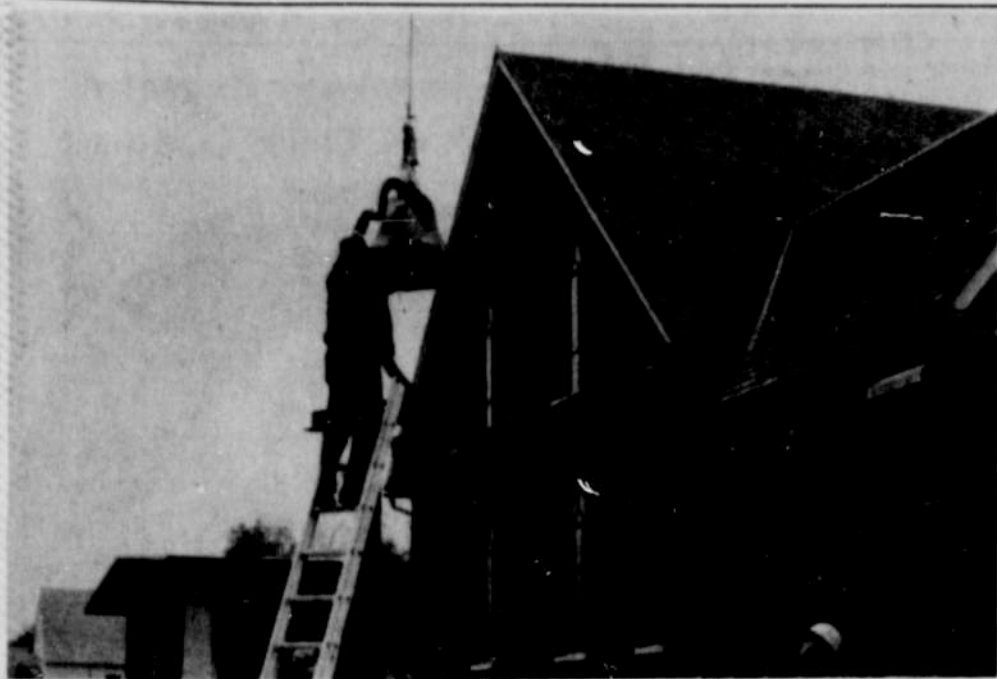


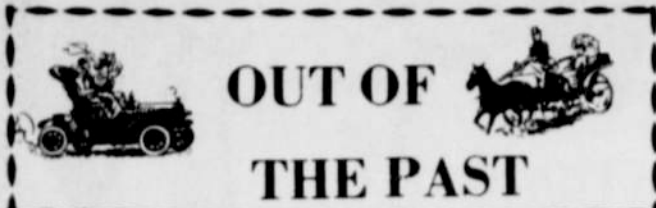

## OUT OF THE PAST

### 10 YEARS AGO

A total of 2944 area residents took polio vaccine at the free clinic in Nyssa Saturday and Sunday, according to Dr. David Sarazin, chairman.

This was about 60 percent of the number prepared for and was disappointing since the medical authorities had hoped for at least 80 percent of the population taking the doses.

As the final results were tabulated from the Nyssa-Adrian Halloween UNICEF drive, a number of facts presented themselves and have been given to the Journal by the Rev. Wallace Prowell of Nyssa First Christian Church.

### 20 YEARS AGO

Nyssa voters Tuesday re-elected Emil A. Stunt to serve on the city council and chose Thomas Jones, Clifford Mink and Dale Bingham as new councilmen to fill the other three vacancies.

Malheur County voters went along with the rest of Oregon and the nation to vote overwhelmingly in favor of Dwight D. Eisenhower for president and carried the more than two-to-one choice through in their selection of a Republican U.S. Representative, Secretary of State and State Treasurer.

The number of Polio cases in Malheur Memorial Hospital dropped to 21 Thursday morning from last week's high of 26, although five new cases were admitted during the past week.

### 30 YEARS AGO

While specific information has not as yet been received regarding the rationing of gasoline, the following information approximates the procedure involved, according to Superintendent Henry Hartley of the local schools.

The local elementary school faculty will issue the basic ration book on November 12, 13, and 14 at the schoolhouse. It is understood that the local school will serve the entire Nyssa area.

Car owners will apply at any service station for the necessary application blank. They will fill in the blank and present it, together with the registration card of the vehicle in question, at the school in order to receive the basic rationing book.

Unofficial tabulations show that Grant Rinehart was elected city recorder by a slim margin over M.F. Solomon in the only hotly contested race in the city election held Tuesday. Walter Marshall trailed far behind with only half as many votes as the other candidates.
