69 Women At Law School
A total of 69 women and 14 minority students are attending law school at the University of Oregon this fall, where only a few years ago either was a rarity.

According to George Dawson, director of the U of O Law School's admissions office, the increasing number of women and minority law students is significant because law traditionally has been a white male profession. "Women who apply tend to have relatively better credentials, as a group, than do the men as a group," he stated. "Generally a woman is highly motivated and dedicated before she ever decides to apply to law school. Because of these higher credentials of women applicants, a relatively higher percentage of women applicants are accepted than men."

Of the minority persons attending the UO Law School this fall, five are Black, three are American Indian, five are Asian-American, and one is Mexican-American. Four of the group are women.

Bond Sales Set Record

Oregonians continued to express their confidence in U. S. Savings Bonds as a sound investment package by purchasing \$3,431,116 worth of Savings Bonds in September. The September sales raised Oregonians' purchases to \$36,010,416 for the January through September period. This is an increase of \$4,205,815 in sales over the like period of 1971 when Oregon led the nation in percentage of bond attained in U. S. Savings Bond sales.

Local Savings Bond officials attributed Oregon's stimulated activity in Savings Bonds first to the new 5 1/2% interest rate and the shortened maturity date of 5 years and 10 months combined with the vast number of Oregon industries who have made the Payroll Savings Plan available to their employees.

Nationally, Sales of Series E Savings Bonds were \$452 million in September, setting a 27-year record for the month. H-Bond sales came to \$20 million, 31 percent over last September, and the highest for any September since 1967. Total Bond sales set a 20-year record for the month and exceeded redemptions, at a cost price, for the 24th consecutive month.

Exchange of Series E for New Series H Bonds were \$26 million for September, 17 percent above last year.

Holdings of E and H Bonds reached \$56.7 billion, \$241 million over last month. With the addition of Freedom Shares -- withdrawn from sale on July 1, 1970 -- holdings reached \$57.2 billion, another all-time high. James Leslie, Malheur County Chairman, reports sales of \$236,182, 94% of the county goal.

U.S. BANK OFFERS COLLEGE DIRECTORY

"College Scope," a directory of all accredited four-year colleges and universities in the United States containing much individualized information, has again been made available to high school counselors throughout Oregon by United States National Bank of Oregon for the 1972-73 school year.

Last year, approximately 250 counselors throughout Oregon obtained copies of the directory from the bank for the use of interested graduating seniors and their parents.

Information includes total undergraduate enrollment, required entrance tests, the number and dollar value of undergraduate scholarships available, annual tuition, approximate annual board and room, and principal courses of study. Mailing addresses are also given for the schools.

Information is given on a total of 1,250 institutions of higher learning, of which 21 are in Oregon.

The directory, the only one of its type in Oregon, has been distributed by the U. S. Bank for the past seven years.
