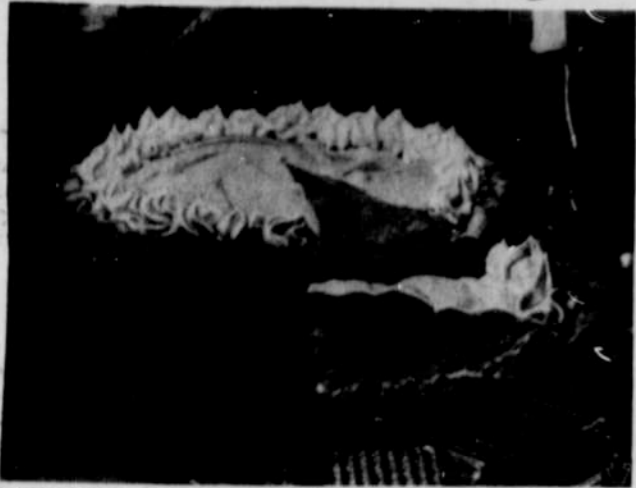


**Tried & True With Something New**



The traditional holiday pumpkin pie is given a modern touch. Cool Whip Non-Dairy Whipped Topping is combined with canned pumpkin for a delicious Fluffy Pumpkin Pie. A decorative ring of the whipped topping completes this elegant dessert.

**Fluffy Pumpkin Pie**

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice\*
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 can (16 oz.) pumpkin
- 2 cups (or one 4 1/2-oz. container) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell, cooled

\*Or use 1/4 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg, and ginger. Combine sugar, gelatin, spice, and salt in saucepan. Blend in milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until sugar and gelatin are dissolved and mixture just comes to a boil. Gradually stir hot mixture into egg. Blend in pumpkin, chill until very thick. Then blend in 1 cup of the whipped topping. Spoon into pie shell. Chill until firm — about 3 hours. Garnish with remaining whipped topping.

**Owyhee Lake Improvements**

A phone call from Dave Talbot, Oregon State Park superintendent this week disclosed that improvements will be made soon to recreation facilities on Lake Owyhee.

Malheur County Judge Ellis White said this morning that the improvements include a boat ramp and parking space between the two existing state parks. This is expected to cost \$60,000.

Judge White said Talbot told him the lower park, now only a picnic area, will have accommodations installed for overnight camping.

Talbot also commented that the state and the Bureau of Recreation is now working on plans for greater improvements for the state park complex in that same general area. This work is expected to cost about a quarter million dollars.

Judge White said the additions to the recreation area represent long periods of work on the part of local residents. He cited the inadequate parking at the boat ramp near the dam as a reason for further and extensive development, especially with the increase of recreational use of the area.

Talbot told the judge that work on the first phase, the boat ramp between the parks and additional parking will begin in the near future with an eye toward spring or early summer completion.

**ARMY OFFERS ELECTRICAL COURSE**

More than half the craftsmen employed in 1970 were engaged in servicing equipment and machinery in manufacturing plants.

Most maintenance electricians must learn their skills during a very long apprenticeship program or during longer periods of time through informal on-the-job training.

In industry, apprenticeship programs for maintenance electricians usually last four years," Sergeant Hoitt said. He continued, "In the Army you can acquire much of the required training in three years or less and be paid a handsome salary to boot." All beginning soldiers earn \$268 per month along with free housing, meals, complete dental and medical benefits and 30 days vacation each year.

In the Army, you also get on-the-job training and related technical classroom instruction in such subjects as mathematics, electrical and electronic theory and blueprint reading.

It's a wide open field, one which will naturally grow along with American industry. Fortunately, the Modern Volunteer Army offers the training.

Over 1,600 delegates are expected to attend the 51st National 4-H Congress in Chicago, November 26-30. The 4-H winners from all over the country will be accompanied by some 250 4-H leaders and greeted by some 300 representatives of 4-H donor organizations and over 200 members of the press. Total attendance at this year's Congress is expected to exceed 2,400.

This winter, two TV series for 4-H'ers and other young people, will premiere on stations across the country. One show, about nutrition, is called "Mulligan Stew," and stars a young rock group. "Living in a Nuclear Age," is the other 4-H TV program, which explains the uses of nuclear energy. It stars Mel Blanc, famous as the voice of "Bugs Bunny."

Five million boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 are part of the 4-H program. This makes 4-H America's largest youth organization. Supporting their efforts are a half million volunteer adult leaders, the men and women of the Cooperative Extension Service, the National 4-H Service Committee, and 55 business donors.

Some of the activities of the 96,000 4-H clubs in the U. S. have been: instituting drug abuse seminars, tractor safety checks, action programs to clean up pollution, public demonstrations on improving nutrition, participating in rural development planning, and helping to curb livestock diseases.
