Information Centers Closed For Winter

State Visitor Information Centers at six ports of entry were recently closed for the winter after a busy tourist season, it was announced today by Vic Fryer, director of travel information for the Highway Division.

The centers are open from May to November and are an essential ingredient to the Division's tourism program, Fryer said. "Our objective is to encourage all tourists--be they Oregonians or out-of-staters--to extend their stay in Oregon by visiting all parts of the state, particularly those areas which are off the beaten track."

Fryer noted that Highway economists have recently estimated that expenditures of out-of-state visitors in Oregon would increase nearly 30 percent if each tourist stayed in Oregon one day longer. He estimated that out-of-state visitors spent more than \$460 million in Oregon in 1972.

Almost 215,000 visitors were provided with travel information during the past season as compared to about 165,000 persons the previous year. The increase was due in part to more visitors at existing centers but most of it was accounted for by the opening of two new centers this year, Fryer explained.

The new centers opened this

year are located in rest areas adjacent to Interstate 80N east of Ontario and US101 north of Brookings. The Ontario center opened June 10 and served 37,856 visitors during the season. Brookings opened on September 13 and during the short period it was opened served 3,469 visitors.

The other four centers are located near the Siskiyou Summit, adjacent to Interstate 5 south of Ashland; near the Interstate 5 in north Portland near the Astoria Bridge, adjacent to US101; and near Midland, adjacent to US97 south of Klamath Falls.

All but one center showed an increase in visitors over the previous year. The Siskiyou center was the busiest serving 76,676 visitors, or a 5.5 percent increase over the previous year. The center at Astoria handled 22,561 requests this year compared to 21,233 in 1971. The Midland center totaled 23,533 visitors this year compared to 16,798 the year before.

Portland was the only center to show a downward trend in visitors with 50,441 visitors stopping in 1972 compared to 55,128 in 1971.

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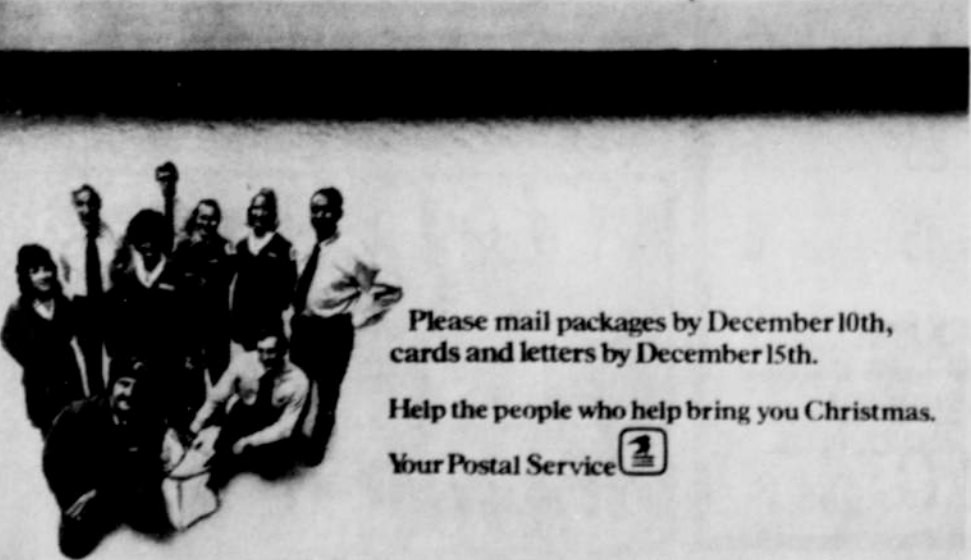


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
