Some of the most popular 4-H programs are: clothing, consumer education, bicycle, dairy foods, food-nutrition, photography and public speaking.

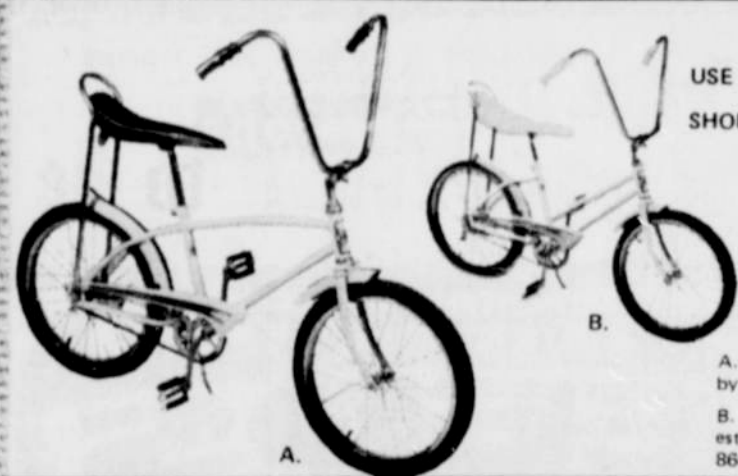


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
