Oregon Exceeds Savings Goal

Oregonians purchased \$4,064,614 worth of U.S. Savings Bonds during the month of October. This banner sales performance boosted Oregon's year-to-date sales figure to \$40,075,030, exceeding the state's annual sales goal of \$39,900,000 in the first ten months.

Local Savings Bonds representatives were elated with the October results as they feel that the state is now in strong contention to retain its Number One position nationally in the percentage of goal attained.

State Chairman Thomas Prudeaux, in releasing the figures stated: "We now feel we are a real contender to retain our Number One rating because the support of the Savings Bonds program is statewide in scope. We only have three counties that are not now definitely assured of surpassing their annual quotas. Historically, Oregonians have purchased vast amounts of Savings Bonds in their colorful Christmas envelopes for Christmas giving. We feel this extra impetus will give us the greatest year in the history of the state."

Nationally, Savings Bonds sales continue to show great growth. The October sales of \$467 million was 15% above October 1971 and established a 27-year record. Interest earned and added to E-Bon holdings was \$211 million. Bond sales exceeded redemptions at cost price by \$140 million, the twenty-fifth consecutive month they have done so. E and H holdings continued their steady rise, reaching a record \$56.9 billion. With the inclusion of Freedom Shares holdings, they reached a grand total of \$57.52 billion, a rise of \$3.1 billion over last October.

Malheur County Chairman Jim Leslie reported total sales through October of \$256,876, which is 103% of the goal.

Health Hints

When chilly slopes and snow-covered fields beckon skiers and snowmobilers, frostbite is a possibility.

It can happen to anyone who is outdoors in sub-freezing temperatures for long periods. The condition may be difficult to detect from early symptoms. The frostbitten area is usually not painful at first, but is numb and stiff. The skin whitens, then turns bright pink. When the frostbitten area is warmed, it becomes red and swollen, and large blisters may develop. Severe frostbite can cause gangrene.

Never rub frostbitten skin with snow or ice. This old-fashioned measure only makes matters worse.

Rapid thawing of the tissue is safer than slow thawing. Keep the frozen part in lukewarm water for ten minutes, then blot it dry, gently. Then keep the frozen area dry and warm.

The untrained person cannot determine the seriousness of frostbite. Get medical attention quickly.

Holiday Magic



from your Dairy Godmother

It's cookie time. And here's a way to make five different yummys from one basic dough. Happy holidays.

Butter Cookies

Baking sheets Preheated 400° oven
1 cup (2 sticks) butter 2½ cups sifted regular
1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
confectioners sugar 1 teaspoon baking soda
1 egg 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 teaspoon vanilla ¼ teaspoon salt

In a mixing bowl cream butter; gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Sift together flour, baking soda, cream of tartar and salt; gradually add to creamed mixture. Shape dough according to variations.

Clip and fold on this line to fit your recipe file.

Variations

Roller Butter Crispies: Chill dough. Roll dough ¼" thick on floured surface. Flour cookie cutters and cut in shapes. Sprinkle with sugar and bake 6-8 min. Remove to wire rack. Yield about 6 doz.

Jewel Drops: Add 1 cup chopped mixed candied fruit to chilled dough. Drop rounded teaspoons on baking sheet. Bake 8-10 minutes. Remove to wire rack. Yield: 5-6 doz.

Snowballs: Add 1 cup finely chopped walnuts to basic dough. Chill dough for ease in handling. Shape into ¾" balls. Bake 8-10 min. Remove and roll in confectioners sugar. Yield: 9-10 doz.

Snicker-Doodles: Chill dough. Shape into balls 1 inch in diameter; roll in mixture of ¼ cup sugar and 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Bake 10-12 min. Yield: 6-7 doz.

Refrigerator Cookies: Melt and cool 2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate and add to dough. Chill for ease in handling. On lightly floured surface form into rolls 2-inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper and chill several hours or overnight. Cut into ½" slices and bake 6-8 min. Yield: 5-6 doz.
