Both men and women can strike out some years of low earnings, but because of the different ages used, it works out that men must use three more years of earnings than women do in figuring the average yearly earnings on which the monthly benefit-rate based," Peckham said.

Under the new law, men who reach 62 in 1973 will be able to drop an additional year of low earnings, men reaching 62 in 1974 will drop an additional two years, and men reaching 62 in 1975 will drop an additional three years.

Also, reduced benefits will said. now be provided for nondisabled widowers at age 60, as now the case for widows.

"So in 1975, at least in these respects, men and women will be just alike," Peckham said.
