**Consumers Want to Know**

Why do some manufacturers charge extra for an automatic cord reel on a vacuum cleaner? Shouldn't such safety features be mandatory?

Some persons can operate a vacuum cleaner with no cord entanglements. They may find a cord reel unnecessary. Others constantly hassle with the cord and will undoubtedly find the automatic cord reel well worth the extra cost. Safety and convenience features for some consumers are viewed as price boosters by others. That's why manufacturers usually offer them as optional.

Are attachments usually included in the purchase price of a vacuum cleaner?

It's a good idea to check to see which tools are included in the advertised price. Attachments are usually optional for upright cleaners. Canister tank-type cleaners usually include a hose, two wands, a rug cleaning tool, a bare floor sweeper, upholstery tool, dusting brush and crevice tool.

Is a one-year guarantee standard for all vacuum cleaners?

Most manufacturers of vacuum cleaners offer a guarantee of one year on parts and labor. Occasionally, you'll find some parts are guaranteed for less time.

**Favorite Foods**

When friends drop in during the holidays, - have a Hot Spiced Punch ready to serve!

Our weather has mellowed but still, punch is good to serve for relaxation to create friendly conversation.

My family from Ellensburg, Washington, serves a Wassail Bowl Punch to friends and here's how they assemble it.

**WASSAIL BOWL**

- 6 cups apple juice
- 1 # 2 can pineapple juice
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 3/4 cup honey
- 2 cinnamon sticks
- 1 tsp. cloves (ground)
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. lemon rind

Simmer the apple juice and cinnamon for ten minutes. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for ten more minutes.

Serve immediately or store in refrigerator and reheat in small servings as guests arrive. Serves 20.

Hot spiced grape juice is always acceptable on a cold, wintry day. I canned a lot of grape juice last fall and for variety I usually spice it to serve during the winter.

**HOT MULLED GRAPE JUICE**

- Serves 8
- 2 qts. grape juice
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 to 2 cinnamon sticks
- 4 whole cloves
- 4 whole allspice

Tie the spices in a small bag and drop into a large saucepan. Pour in the grape juice and sugar. Bring mixture to a boil. Let stand for ten minutes. Remove

**MEAT BALLS STROGANOFF**

- 4 pounds ground beef
- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 tablespoon salt
- pepper to taste
- 6 tablespoons butter
- 2 large onions, chopped
- 1 pound mushrooms, sliced (or 1 8-ounce can)
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1/2 cup liquor of choice
- 2 cups sour cream

Have lean chuck or sirloin ground twice for extra fineness. Soak crumbs in milk, add eggs, beat well. Blend with meat, adding salt and pepper to taste. Shape into small balls. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in large skillet, brown meat balls on all sides, shaking the pan to keep them round. Remove meat balls to heavy pan. Add remaining butter to skillet, cook onions and mushrooms until just tender and translucent. Sprinkle with flour, stir a minute or two. Add liquor and cook, stirring into brown bits, until the sauce thickens slightly. Stir in sour cream and heat. Keep hot until serving time. Makes 32 hors d'oeuvre servings.

**DRY MANHATTANS**

- 1 fifth (25 oz.) rye, bourbon or blend
- 1 cup (8 oz.) dry vermouth
- Garnish: twists of lemon peel

Combine whiskey and vermouth in a tall pitcher with ice cubes. Stir and pour into cocktail glasses. Garnish with lemon twist. Makes about 17 drinks.

**Chemist Jobs Scarce**

**Alien Address Report Due January 19, 1973**

William L. Pattillo, District Director, of the Immigration and Naturalization Service advised today that the annual alien address report program is again underway, with January 19, 1973 the deadline.

According to Mr. Pattillo, 25,982 aliens reported their addresses last year in the State of Oregon. The number this year is expected to be slightly larger.

The Immigration official pointed out that the address reports are required by law and willful failure to comply with these requirements may lead to serious consequences. Forms with which to make the reports are available at

all Post Offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service Offices. It is an easy matter to fill out one of the cards and return it to the same office. For those unable to personally return the cards, they may be mailed to the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Mr. Pattillo added that trained personnel will be on hand in all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to answer any questions the reporting aliens may have regarding Immigration and Naturalization matters. Sufficient trained personnel are not available to furnish this assistance in all Post Offices.

**Equitable Approves Dividend, Stock Split**

The board of directors of Equitable Savings and Loan Association approved a fourth quarter cash dividend and a two for one stock split at the December board meeting held in Portland, Oregon, Tuesday, December 19, according to William E. Love, President and chief executive officer.

A regular cash dividend of 11 1/4 cents per share will be paid on January 25, 1973 to stockholders of record at the close of business on January 5, 1973.

The Equitable stock split of two shares for one will be submitted to Equitable stockholders and members at the annual meeting to be held on March 27, 1973 at the Equitable Center in Portland. If approved, the stock split will be effective at the close of business on March 30, 1973. According to Love, the stock split must also be approved by savings and loan regulatory authorities.

Equitable currently has outstanding 912,169 shares of common stock, \$4 par value. The two for one split will double the shares outstanding and the par value will be reduced from \$4 to \$2 per share.
