**Coast Guard Adds Women**

Coast Guardsmen soon will be seeing more of an unusual item in their clothing stores: skirts.

The skirts are an indication of a change coming to the nearly all-male service as the Coast Guard expands its active duty program for women.

Currently the only women in the Coast Guard are Reservists serving on active duty. The Service presently lacks authority to appoint or enlist women into the Regular branch of the Coast Guard, however it will seek legislation permitting women to serve in the Regulars on the same basis as men.

Under the new program about 125 women (25 officers and 100 enlisted) will be accepted each year.

Depending on the needs of the Service, women officers will be allowed to serve in any specialty in which the Coast Guard can utilize their educational training. Enlisted women will be eligible to enter any one of six career fields ranging from Hospital Corpsman to Photojournalist. Neither officers nor enlisted women will serve aboard Coast Guard cutters, at isolated stations or as aircrewmembers.

**STEM Program Needs Our Help**

Calling shoplifting a direct reason why consumers are paying higher prices for goods, Governor Tom McCall has urged Oregonians to assist the Oregon Retail Council sponsored STEM (Shoplifters Take Everybody's Money) program.

"Shoplifting is regarded as an almost invisible crime," the governor said. "We hear little of it and most of us see none of it, yet it is a most serious law enforcement problem."

McCall added, "Oregon newspapers, radio and television stations are participating in the program to curb shoplifting. I encourage all Oregonians to assist our businessmen and law enforcement agencies to rid our state of this invidious crime."

ORC President Lawrence Winthrop told newsmen last week the STEM program has been widely received and will run through the 31st of January 1973.

"We're talking about a crime that takes \$25 million from Oregonians every year," Winthrop said. "We're extending our program one month past the original cut-off date in the hope that more potential shoplifters will take warning of the consequences what shoplifting offers and STEM talks about."
