

Favorite Foods

Everything is "hurry-up" now and so, why not cook food which is good but "hurry-up". I often cook a meat loaf which can be mixed in minutes but tastes as tho I spent at least 1/2 hour measuring and mixing, and looking for seasonings. I use mushroom soup, youngsters would like tomato soup. The dehydrated onion soup is the secret ingredient.

HURRY-UP MEAT LOAF

2-lbs. lean, ground beef
1 - 10 1/2 oz. can tomato, mushroom, or celery soup
2 eggs, beaten
1 pkg. (1 1/4 oz.) dehydrated onion soup
Combine all ingredients. Spoon mixture into a 5"x9"x2 1/3" loaf pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Serves 8.

We like to prepare foods ahead, especially salads, because they are usually time-consuming.

The following salad is colorful and very tasty. You might use it with hot rolls when en-

tertaining the neighborhood club or the women in your church group. It has 3 layers.

RIBBON SALAD

1 3-oz. pkg. lime jello
1 cup hot water
1 cup cold water
1 3-oz. pkg. lemon jello
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup small marshmallows
1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
1 3-oz. pkg cream cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup cream, whipped
1 3-oz. pkg. cherry jello
1 cup hot water
1 cup cold water
Prepare lime jello and pour into an 8"x8" pan and let set in your refrigerator. Dissolve lemon jello in hot water. Add marshmallows and dissolve. Add pineapple, cream cheese, mayonnaise and whipped cream. Chill. Pour over lime jello when set. Prepare cherry jello. Chill. Pour over pineapple layer. Chill until firm. Serves 12.
