

# Hunters Used Firearms Safely During Season

It's pure fiction that the fields and forests of the state aren't safe to be in during the hunting seasons and the figures are there to prove it. Except for a very small minority, Oregon nimrods are pretty careful with their firearms when they go afield.

Take the deer season, for example, with various rifle hunts held from late September through November and a few into December. During the entire season last fall we estimate roughly around 275,000 deer hunters were in the woods at various times. Yet only 23 people were injured with firearms.

Of the 23 accidents, six were self-inflicted and many others were the result of carelessness around vehicles or in camp and did not happen when the persons were actually hunting. Three deer hunting accidents were fatal.

We don't like to report on hunting accidents with firearms because the reaction of many nonhunters is that this is some sort of suicidal recreation that should be done away with. Yet it is one of the safest of all sports, far safer than swimming, skiing, or other types of outdoor recreation. Actually a person is safer out hunting than he is taking a bath in his home.

No one advocates doing away with swimming as being too dangerous. The recognized course of action is to teach people to swim, recognize the dangers involved, and take precautionary measures to prevent unnecessary drownings. This is also the course of action with those who prefer to hunt.

During the entire year nimrods experienced 64 firearms accidents, seven of which were fatal. In addition to the three deer hunters mentioned, two fatalities occurred during the elk season, one during the upland bird season, and one while hunting nongame critters such as crows and gray diggers.

Of the total accidents, 22 were self-inflicted, indicating again that the hunter is his own worst enemy. Twenty-three more accidents occurred at close quarters of 10 yards or less. Twelve occurred while hunters mis-handled firearms in or around vehicles, and four more while in camp. Four accidents occurred while hunters were illegally hunting, one while spotlighting, one with no hunting license, and two out of season.

Forty-two nimrods wounded their hunting companions or some other hunter. Causes given include several victims stepped into the line of fire, several more were hit by ricochets, and others by accidental discharge. Four hunters were mistaken for game—three for deer and one for elk.

As usual, juveniles were involved in a disproportionate share of accidents. Horseplay

led the list of causes. Several youngsters were hunting without adult supervision and several had no training in firearms safety, both required by law.

Very few mishaps can be termed strictly accidental but are generally the result of pure carelessness with firearms, such as two youngsters wrestling over a firearm in a vehicle. Or the young fellow who placed a cocked pistol back in his holster. Another hunter aimed at a flying bird, then lowered the 22 rifle downward, pulled the trigger, and shot his toe off. One freak accident occurred when a hunter shot a deer in the spine and the bullet actually ricocheted, hitting his companion. Another nimrod shot at a ground squirrel only to have the bullet hit a flat rock, fragment, and have some of the pieces bounce back directly at him.

But we will spare you details of these accidents because we claim hunting ranks as one of the safest of all sports. Statistics show that only a minute fraction of the hunters who go afield each year are even in any danger. Hunting ranks near the bottom of the list compared with other accident categories including all types of outdoor recreation.

When you stop to think that more than 375,000 licensed hunters with high-powered rifles and shotguns spent somewhere around 3-1/2 million man-days in the field last year in pursuit of the various game species, yet had only 64 accidents with firearms, it all adds up to a mighty small percentage with little risk to the individual hunter. Probably another million man-days of recreation were enjoyed by hunters after nongame critters such as rabbits and crows.

Unfortunately, there probably always will be a few hunting accidents caused by careless individuals who disregard the rules of firearms safety. A big point in favor, though, is the Game Commission's excellent juvenile hunter safety program—for adults as well—which will tend to reduce even these small odds.

In our view, when it comes to living a long and enjoyable life, hunting is really the best health insurance a person can have. For sure, this writer's health is always at its best when the hunter's moon shines bright in the fall.

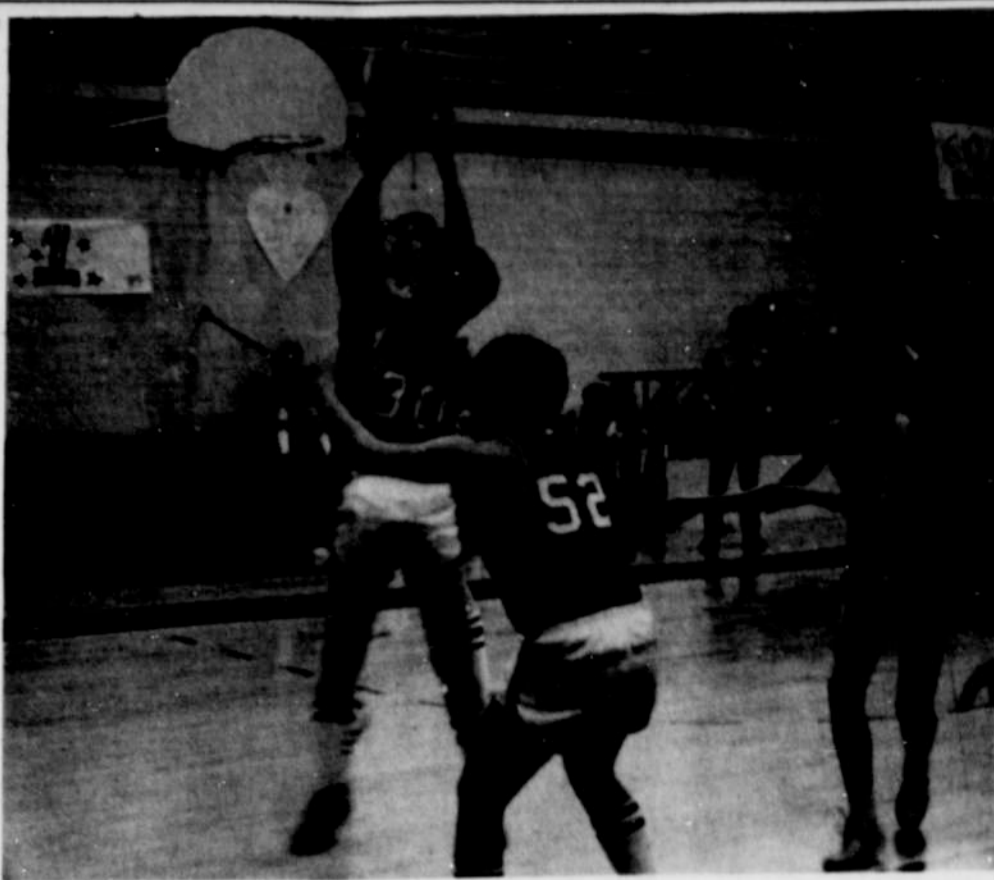

**SALMON-STEELHEAD LICENSES DUE**

Sport fishermen are reminded to return their expired 1972 salmon-steelhead licenses to the Game Commission as soon as possible. The law requires that these licenses be returned following the expiration date. Information obtained from them is vital to the management of the state's more than 70 salmon and steelhead producing rivers.

Collection boxes are located at all license dealers for the convenience of fishermen. The cards may also be returned directly to the Game Commission, 1634 SW Alder, Portland 97208.

Reino Koski, staff biologist who maintains the catch records, advises sport fishermen that the return of the cards cannot be overemphasized. Anglers should return the cards whether they caught fish or not. Information provided is used to compute the statewide salmon and steelhead catch as well as the catch by individual stream.

Total catch figures for 1972 will be available in late June, according to Koski. Anglers wishing to know which streams were the top producers and the months to fish these streams should contact the Commission at that time.

## NOTICE

**PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXPAYERS** are required to file a return of taxable property as of Jan. 1, 1973, 1:00 AM, with the Assessor on or before March 3, 1973. A penalty is provided for late filing.

**INVENTORY OWNERS** (including livestock) will receive a 30% reduction in accordance with inventory reduction law ORS 310.608.

**ANY PERSON** who has not received a personal property form by mail should obtain one by contacting the Assessors office personally or by phone, 473-3192. ORS 308.290 states in part, "... failure to receive or secure a form shall not relieve the person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return ..."

**PENALTY PROVISIONS:** Late filing (ORS 308.295) after March 3, 1973 of personal property returns shall be \$1 for each \$1,000 (or fraction thereof) of the true cash value, but shall not be less than \$10 or more than \$250.

**FAILURE TO FILE** with the Assessor within the specified time with the intent to evade taxation (ORS 308.200) shall be subject to a penalty of \$10 for each day of the continuance of such refusal or neglect.
