The team won first place, defeating Boise Valley Judo Club of Caldwell for the team championship, with each man winning his match.

Industry Cooperates In Teenage Program

Seed money provided by Anheuser-Busch, Inc., stimulated the civic leaders in the Mexican-American community of Los Angeles to create a community program which provided a "happy vacation time" to restless teen-agers. Before school let out last summer an Anheuser-Busch representative met with members of the board of the Salesian Boys' Club to refurbish its badly run-down club facilities and to provide a continuing work program for teenage members of the club.

A \$10,000 brewery donation provided initial financing. Local merchants and friends contributed paint, tile, carpeting and other supplies. The club members supplied the manpower.

Hourly work schedules were established and rate of hourly pay determined. The brewery representative said, "We were more than pleased to find a situation in which we could provide meaningful jobs for youth and could encourage an ongoing project in which a do-it-yourself, hard-work tradition already existed."

The job was completed during the summer and was climaxed by a Mexican fiesta.

New Patent Group

Formation of Intellectual Property Owners, Inc., Washington, D.C., has been announced by William E. Schuyler Jr., chairman, to spur wider recognition for the social and economic values of a strong patent system. Patents which provide inventors exclusive rights for 17 years, encourage inventive genius to develop new technologies and create overseas demand for American developments, Mr. Schuyler said. Stabilizing and strengthening the U.S. patent system, he explained, will provide incentives necessary for this nation to regain lost ground in the export of high-technology products.
