

Creamery Employee, Kirk Retires After 45 Years

Mr. Sherman T. Kirk, plant superintendent of the Dairymen's Creamery Association's operation in Payette, Idaho, has retired after more than 45 years of service with the Association. Mr. Kirk's retirement was announced, effective January 31, by R. C. Hammond, Payette plant manager.

"We are deeply grateful to Sherm for his contribution toward the growth of our organization," Hammond said. "He has been a talented and dedicated employee for nearly

half a century." Kirk began his career for the Dairymen's Creamery Association in Payette on January 2, 1928. He was originally employed as a butter maker and handled the various operations involving butter production which include the techniques of initial formulae, chemical testing and completion of the final product. His constant tests, checks and inspections resulted in a product line of unsurpassed quality. He continued in that capacity in the

Payette and Weiser, Idaho, and Baker, Oregon plants until 1948 at which time he was promoted to the position of plant superintendent in Payette.

In reminiscing about his years of service with Dairymen's Creamery, Kirk recalled the early days when the Payette plant was Idaho's first Co-operative Creamery, then known as the Farmer's Co-operative Creamery. One of the high points in his career, Kirk recalls, was in February, 1968, when the Payette, Meridian and Caldwell Cooperatives consolidated to form Dairymen's Creamery Association for the express purpose of improving the market for dairy farmers in

the ten adjacent Idaho and Eastern Oregon counties.

Kirk was born in Kansas in 1908 and moved with his family to Hill City, Idaho, three years later. He recalls that the family household possessions were shipped by freight from Kansas but the family had to be transported to Hill City by sled because of the intense winter weather and heavy snow conditions.

His wife, Alta, is a native of Payette and a former school teacher in Weiser. The Kirks are members of the Methodist Church and reside in Payette at 267 Decker Drive. They have four children: Sherman Duane Kirk, director of Driver's Training in Boise; Mrs. Barbara Kirk White, presently working on her Doctorate in Foreign Languages at the University of Washington; Mrs. Janice Kirk Garman, whose husband, Donald, is a well-known dairy farmer in the Payette area; and Mrs. Katherine Kirk Patton of Walla Walla, Washington.

Kirk said he and his wife have no definite plans for the immediate future but added that he expects to enjoy some additional golfing and fishing. He said that both he and Mrs. Kirk are looking forward to enjoying their leisure time together.

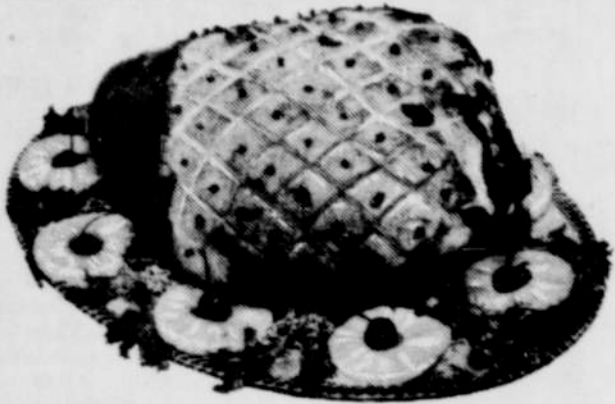

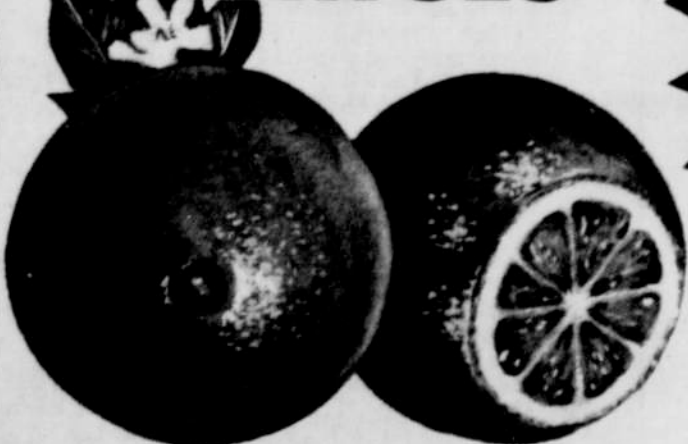
