OREGON TODAY

What will be the hottest issues of the 1973 Legislature? Which bills will fill the large basement hearing room of the State Capitol with 500 to 1000 citizens?

In 1971 the largest crowds turned out to oppose fluoridation of water and to urge restrictions on nuclear power plants. At the 1969 session attendance records were probably set by persons who wanted to protect public access to the beaches and by groups for and against the bill liberalizing abortion. In terms of a single hearing, the record in 1969 may have been set by proponents of the bill to provide the first increase in the level of welfare benefits in 14 years.

Each of these issues was highly emotional. In most cases

the persons who came to the hearing were angry at what they thought was an attempt to deprive them of their rights. The controversies over nuclear power and fluoridation of water turn on issues of human safety. The 1969 controversy over abortion pitted strongly held religious convictions against the then only emerging movement for women's rights. Sometimes attendance at the hearings was produced by a major citizen effort, such as the coalition that put almost 1000 people in the room in 1969 to plead for an increase in welfare benefits. Some issues were fanned into the white heat of controversy by the media. Matt Kramer, late Salem correspondent for the Associated Press, is chiefly responsible for igniting public concern with the beach controversy, aided by editorial after editorial on KGW-TV's evening news.

Legislators concerned with such overwhelming problems as taxes, the leveling of educational support or governmental reform understand that such issues, though of critical importance, do not generate a public outcry one way or the other. During the height of the 1969 controversy over the sales tax I received only a few dozen letters on the subject, compared to many hundred on the more explosive, more personal issues. It is often hard to tell in advance which issue will catch fire. In 1969 the beach bill was around the Legislature for some time before public interest suddenly developed. On the other hand, every one in that session knew that the abortion bill controversy was going to be front and center throughout the session.

So far this session the biggest crowds have turned out for the ratification hearings on the amendment to the United States Constitution providing equal rights for women. There has also been major attention and interest focused on the bill to establish statewide land use planning. At both these hearings people have been angry and have felt threatened, which are the basic ingredients for issues that fill the State Capitol. But the 1973 session has been underway less than a month, and the big fights are still ahead.

Notice of 1973 Feed Grain Bases and Wheat Allotments

Notices of farm feed grain yields and feed grain bases made by or before February 17, which is the 15th day from the date of the official notice.

The appeal period for wheat allotments was several months ago when producers received their first official notice following announcement of the 1973 program. The current notice serves only as a reminder to the producer of his farm's wheat allotment, Glavin said.

Sign-up for the 1973 feed grain and wheat programs begins February 5 at the ASCS county office and continues through March 16. The ASCS Committee Chairman reminded producers that requests for measurement service and set-aside inspection are being accepted now at the county office and said the earlier such requests are made, the earlier the service will be provided. Measurement services are provided at cost by the ASCS county office in order to help farmers be certain they are complying with requirements of farm programs in which they participate.
