HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM AT OSU

High school students and teachers from throughout the state will be selected this month to participate March 8-10 at Oregon State University in the fourth Oregon Junior Science and Humanities Symposium.

A total of 150 students and 50 science-humanities teachers will be chosen to consider "Interrelationships Among Science, Technology and Society."

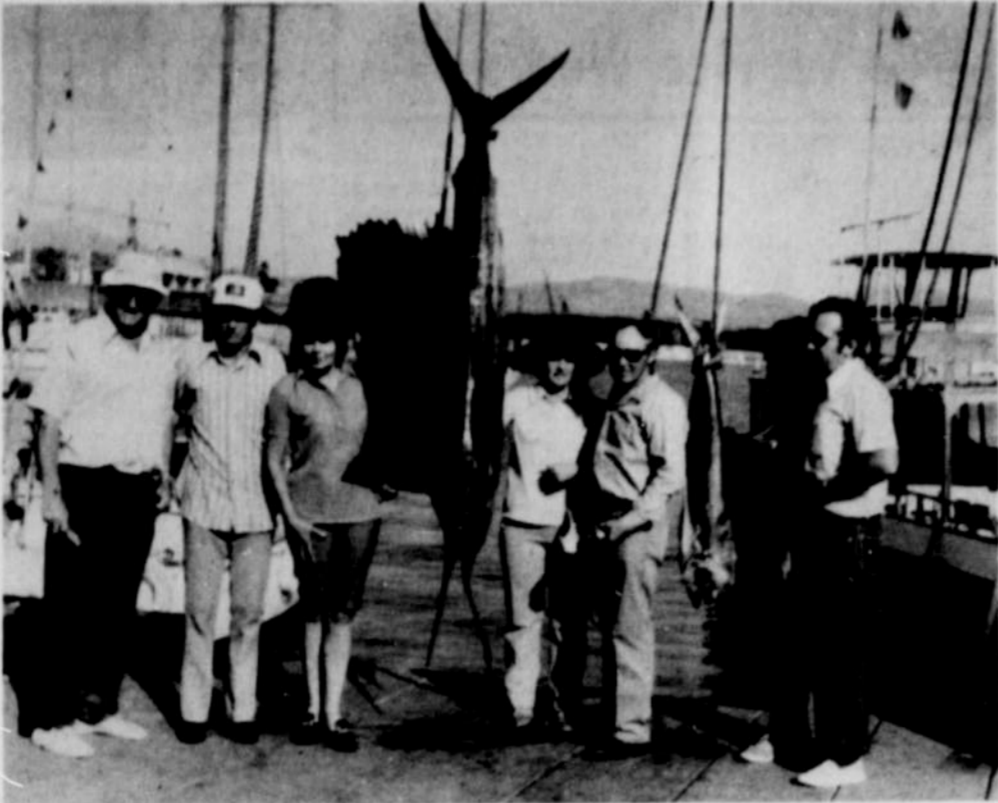
Three national lecturers and 21 OSU professors will speak and lead discussions. Dr. Thomas P. Evans, associate professor of science education, is Symposium director.

Guest lecturers will include Dr. C.H. Cheek, head of the Chemical Oceanography Branch, Naval Research Labora-

tory, Washington, D. C.; John MacLeod, engineer, Manned Spacecraft Center, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Houston, Texas; and Dr. Paul Saltman, vice chancellor for academic affairs, University of California at San Diego.

Six high school students, chosen through the Oregon Academy of Science, will present papers on their individual research projects and also will represent Oregon at the National Junior Science and Humanities Symposium in May at West Point, N.Y.

The OSU Symposium is one of 30 in the U.S. It is funded by a \$5,500 grant from the U.S. Army Research Office.
