

Northwest Judo Tourney Set Saturday At Ontario

The West coast's largest judo tournament gets underway in Ontario this weekend. Action starts at 11 Saturday morning.

The annual event has grown to draw about 300 judo players, coaches, friends and relatives into Ontario. Approximately 75 or 80 trophies will be given to outstanding participants from all over the Northwest.

Players hail from 22 clubs in (2) Seattle, Spokane, Richland, Yakima, Moses Lake, and Bellingham, Washington; Oregon State University, Eastern Oregon College, University of Oregon and Portland, Oregon; Boise Capitol, and Boise Valley, Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Idaho; two in Salt Lake City, and one each in Ogden, Corvallis and Hot Springs, Utah.

Ontario's Ore-Ida Judo Club was organized in 1949 or '50 by Frank Uriu and Sam Muramoto, both now deceased. Each May, the end of the Judo season, an award is given within the Ore-Ida club to the Best Judoist of the Year and an Inspiration Award in memory of the club's founders.

Hank Ogawa, one of the club's 15 or so instructors, took half a dozen of its earliest members in 1952 to their first tournament at Marin Junior

College near San Francisco.

The club sent letters to other judo organizations around the Northwest asking permission to attend their tournaments. Because Ontario is in the center of the Northwest and tourney participants arrive here from all points, other clubs enjoy coming to Ontario because of the tremendous level and amount of competition.

Five clubs were represented at Ore-Ida's first tourney in 1951. They were from Seattle, Portland, Salt Lake and Boise Valley.

The Ore-Ida club maintains an annual average of about 100 members, certainly the largest club in the Northwest and Inter-Mountain area.

The tournament this weekend has three age groups with three weight classes each. Junior, Intermediate, and Senior division eliminations, and team matches will use up Saturday afternoons.

Toshiro Nagato, local 4th Degree Black Belt will perform the 10 man "slaughter line" which has always been a crowd pleasing event.

The club traditionally asks a donation at the entrance door of \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

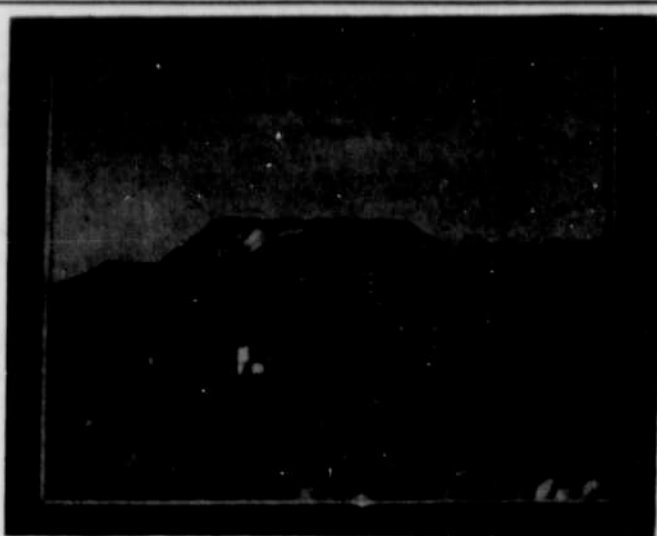

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Steelhead Egg-Take Now Underway At Hatcheries

Steelhead anglers, and others interested in the production of these fine game fish, are invited to stop at one of the Game Commission's fish hatcheries if they'd like to see first-hand the egg-taking operations now getting under-way.

Fish hatcheries now handling brood fish include Cedar Creek on the Nestucca, Alsea located on the Alsea North Fork, Rock Creek on the upper Umpqua, Butte Falls on the upper Rogue, Roaring River located near Scio in the Willamette Valley, Round Butte on the Deschutes, and the Wallawa Hatchery near Enterprise. Egg-taking activities will increase as steelhead mature, reaching a peak in March.

Summer-run steelhead are generally the first to mature and spawn. Trapped at a number of stations during the past summer, these big ironheads are held in deep holding pools through the fall and winter at such stations as Roaring River, Rock Creek, and Butte Falls. Winter-run fish are now appearing at trapping sites on various streams including the

traps at Cedar Creek, Alsea North Fork, and Enterprise. Around 4 million or more eggs will be taken from summer and winter races for the hatchery program.

An interesting sight to watch is the trapping operation at the Alsea North Fork, where the big ironheads are trapped at a weir a short distance above the hatchery, high-lined by cable across the river, then hauled to the holding ponds at the station. Many fish are also hauled to other tributaries in the drainage to augment the wild spawning populations.

Also going on at these and other stations is the annual grading and marking of steelhead youngsters in preparation for the spring plants. Almost ready to smolt, these young steelhead are sorted into size groups, then run through an assembly line where they are fin-clipped for identification when they return from the sea as mature adults. Planting steelhead smolts into some 30 Oregon streams is expected to get underway in March and will be completed in April.
