

Malheur IED Budget Committee Meets

The Malheur IED Budget Committee met February 5, to discuss and approve financial concerns of the 1973-74 school year. Members of the committee are the regular board members: William G. Ross, Robert Skinner, Gerrit Timmerman, Tak Kuwahara, Roy Holmes, Dr. Lester Scott, and George Pressley; and seven additional personnel who are W. B. Schlupe, Val Dice, Allen Baltzor, Gene Stunz, Carl Hill, Frank Blankinship, and Julian Arrien.

By an unanimous vote, Julian Arrien was elected chairman and Gene Stunz was elected secretary of the budget board. Budget officer Leroy Paulsen then explained the equalization levy and the administrative (office) budget. The equalization fund is computed by State of Oregon formula and is used as a direct offset after subtracting the administrative budget against

school district budgets. The amount necessary is derived by taking one-half of the total net force the rate to \$38 operating budgets of all the school districts in Malheur County and multiplying by a student growth ratio. After two years in which the enrollment has been smaller than the current enrollment, the enrollment for 1973-74 is computed to be slightly larger. The current enrollment is 6,160 and the anticipated 1973-74 enrollment is 6,186. The growth ratio is 1.00422 and when used in the formula the determined amount is \$1,891,298.26 which is an increase of \$280,038.04 from last year.

The office or administrative IED budget was approved by the committee for a tax levy of \$104,998 which is an increase of \$25,305 over the current year. This is due to decrease of funds from the state and also not having any cash on hand. The rate per \$1,000 for

the office budget is \$3.30 per \$1,000 and this increase will force the rate to \$3.38 per \$1,000. The equalization school rate is \$5.79 per \$1,000 and will go to \$6.80 per \$1,000 for next year. These total \$6.09 and \$7.21 per \$1,000 respectively based on current property valuation.

The budget election for the amount above the 6% limitation will be May 7, 1973 (Annual School Election date). The amount to be voted upon is \$649,545.34 for a total of \$1,996,296.26.

Paulsen said that people who do not understand IED budgeting procedures should feel free to telephone or visit the IED office. For example, the \$649,545.34 if not passed, simply means that each school district must increase (proportionately) its own local school tax for this identical amount as the offset is reduced accordingly, as each district would receive approximately \$200.24 per student as compared to about \$305 per student. The cost of the IED services such as film library, speech therapy, student testing, duplicating etc., are controlled by the administrative budget \$104,998 and this is well within the tax base of \$1,346,750.92, and have been requested by two-thirds or more of the fourteen school districts in Malheur County. The Mary Kay School was requested by only seven of the fourteen school districts and therefore cannot be placed in the budget. However, the IED is willing to contract with districts as was done this year.

The budget hearing has been scheduled for Monday, March 12, 1973, in the IED office at 8:00 p.m. It is a public meeting and interested people are invited to attend.
