DRINKING DRIVERS CAUSE FATALITIES

More than half of the people killed in traffic last year had been drinking, according to information released Thursday by Chester W. Ott, Administrator of the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division.

The Division said the report was based on blood alcohol tests given by medical examiners to more than 61 percent of the state's 733 traffic victims.

Ott said that 30 percent of those with readings had blood alcohol contents of .15 or more and by far the greatest percentage of these had reading: above .20. A driver is presumed to be under the influence in Oregon when he has a reading of .10.

Ott said the number of traffic victims being tested for blood alcohol content rose sharply last year, but the number found to be drinking at the time remained about the same as in other years. In previous years, the tests had been given to no more than 40 percent of the state's traffic victims.
