Under the rationing program, which will be started March 1, the average family will be allowed less than half of the canned fruits and vegetables they have been accustomed to using.

The ration in the "scant ration" program for March will be 48 points which will allow about three cans per person during the month.

Families will be permitted to pool their points, which are considered by many persons as rather high. For instance examples are as follows: Average can of peas, 16 points; corn 14; tomatoes 16; asparagus 14;

spinach 11; peaches 21; pears 21; sliced pineapple 24; grapefruit 10 and fruit cocktail 11; soup 6 points; juices 15 to 32 points.

Approximately 2700 persons registered at the grade school building for ration book No. 2 Monday to Wednesday of this week.

Twenty-four Nyssa school teachers, under the direction of Owen Price, principal of the grade school, registered the consumers.
