"Parent to Child About Sex" Lectures

"Parent to Child About Sex" is the theme for a series of three meetings to be held in Ontario, February 27, 28 and March 1.

This series of meetings is planned to help parents in their job of providing information to their children and giving guidance in areas relating to sexual behavior.

Children and youth of today are bombarded on all sides by information relating to sex development and sexual behavior. However, most of them don't have the basic knowledge necessary to make responsible decisions. They want to get information from their parents about those things they don't understand, but often find their parents aren't able to explain or else evade their question. Older children report their parents don't really talk with them about some of the critical issues they face in their

relationships to each other. At the same time studies indicate they would prefer to get their information from their parents. Parents, likewise, report confusion as they try to guide their children in a time when values appear to be changing in the entire area of relationships between boys and girls, men and women. They find that children are challenging their beliefs and values and expecting them to be able to give sound, logical reasons for their beliefs.

The February 27 meeting -- "What every child wants to know and doesn't ask" will deal with the kinds of questions children ask from the preschool years through Junior High. Parents will have an opportunity to practice answering typical questions of children to see how their answers or lack of answers build attitudes in children about themselves, their bodies, and their responsibility to themselves and to others.

"What every child wants to know and doesn't ask" is the topic for February 28. It will focus primarily on sexual behavior and responsibilities and will deal with some of the concerns expressed by parents and children.

The third session, March 1, "Issues parents face in guiding youth" will focus on dating and living arrangements and will help parents clarify their own beliefs and values.

Sessions will be conducted by Mrs. Roberta Frasier Anderson, Extension Family Life Specialist, Oregon State University. Mrs. Anderson has helped parents in other areas of the state examine these same issues.

All sessions will be held at the Administration Building at Treasure Valley Community College. The meetings will begin at 8:00 and close at 10:00 p.m. Pre-enrollment is necessary. Those enrolling should plan to attend all three sessions. Please telephone or write the Malheur County Extension Office and make your reservations for the evening sessions.

This series of meetings is an outgrowth of the Home Economics Extension Planning Committee, according to Helen Conner, Malheur County Extension Home Economist.

WHAT IS A PENNY WORTH?
