If you're counting calories these days this recipe isn't for you but if you want to make a hit with all your friends and the teenage set, serve this Banana Split Pie. For more height and eye appeal, top this pie with a whipped topping. Your friends will throw up their hands in horror and groan at the amount of calories and relish every bite of this pie.

### BANANA SPLIT PIE

Filling:  
1/2 cup butter or margerine  
1 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar  
2 eggs  
1 tsp. vanilla  
3 med. sized ripe bananas  
1 tsp. fresh lemon juice  
1 ounce square chocolate, grated  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Beat butter until creamy add sugar gradually, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating 3 minutes after each addition, using electric mixer. Blend in vanilla. Peel and slice two bananas. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Fold chocolate and banana into sugar mixture. Pour into cooled baked pie shell. Sprinkle with walnuts. Chill 2 or 3 hours. Third banana is sliced on top of pie before serving, then topped with whipped topping.

ASPARAGUS SUPREME  
1 #2 can asparagus tips, drained  
1 8-oz. can cream of mushroom soup  
1 8-oz. can fried onion rings  
Pour asparagus tips into a 1-quart baking dish. Cover with mushroom soup. Top with fried onion rings. Bake in a 350 degree oven, until hot and bubbly, about 20 minutes. Serves 6.
