NOTICE OF SPECIAL TAX LEVY ELECTION TREASURE VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT MALHEUR AND BAKER COUNTIES, OREGON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election has been called to be held in the Treasure Valley Community College District on Monday, March 12, 1973 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the Treasure Valley Community College District for their approval or rejection a proposed tax levy for the fiscal year 1973-74 in the total amount of \$659,291 to finance, in part, the operating budget previously approved by the Budget Committee of the District.

The ballot title to be submitted to the voters is as follows:
**TAX LEVY MEASURE SUBMITTED BY
TREASURE VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT**
The Treasure Valley Community College District has no tax base, thus requiring voter approval for a tax levy necessary to finance, in part, the operating budget of the district. The district's budget committee approved an operating budget which provides for \$63,347 increase of the 1972-73 operating budget.

That portion of the proposed operating budget to be financed by the levy of local taxes for the tax year 1973-74 is \$659,291 which if approved will be \$37,319 greater than that portion of the operating budget financed by local taxes for the previous year. The Board has calculated that the tax rate per \$1,000 of true cash value, if the levy is approved, shall be \$2.39.

Registered voters resident within the District 30 days prior to the election shall be entitled to vote. The voters shall place a cross (X) or a check mark (✓) in the box () beside "YES," I vote for the tax levy, or in the box () beside "NO, I vote against the tax levy," whichever shall indicate his choice.

Polling places will be opened at the hour of 8:00 a.m. on Monday, March 12, 1973, and will remain open until the hours of 8:00 p.m. local time on that date when the polls will be closed and the vote canvassed.

For 35 springtimes the Na-
tional Wildlife Federation has
sponsored Wildlife Week. This
year the 36th observance will
be celebrated March 18 through
24. Theme for the 1973 event
is "Discover Wildlife-It's Too
Good to Miss."

Betty Staton, Oregon Wildlife
Federation, and Cal Giesler,
hunter safety supervisor for the
Game Commission, will co-
chair the event and organize
Wildlife Week observances and
workshops throughout the state.
Wildlife Week kits, complete
with posters and other infor-
mation, are now being distribu-
ted to schools and outdoor clubs
statewide.

Mrs. Staton, an enthusiastic
supporter of wildlife con-
servation, said that the young
wildlife on the front of this year's
poster is about to discover a
whole new world. "All of us
can learn about this new world,
too," the co-chairman advised.
"Wildlife can be found almost

WATERFOWL NUMBERS DOWN THIS WINTER

Oregon's annual winter wa-
terfowl inventory for 1973 show-
ed the population of ducks down
from the previous winter but
an increase in the wintering
goose population. Overall there
was about 10 percent fewer
birds wintering in the state
than one year ago.

Mallards and widgeon num-
bers increased considerably
from the previous winter, with
the major drop in numbers oc-
curring in the wintering po-
pulation of pintails. The duck
population totaled just over
403,500 birds compared with
459,300 in 1972.

The goose population totaled
just over 88,900 birds, almost
