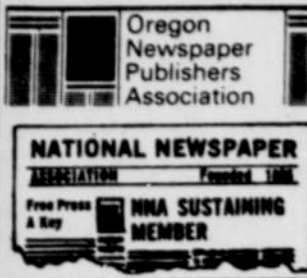

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Jobs For Veterans Campaign

An estimated 12,000 veterans are looking for suitable work in Oregon.

A great number of these are Viet Nam-era veterans--young men who took a year or more out of their lives to help bring "a lasting peace to the world in our time."

Many who had jobs before going into the service will return to them, but many who didn't will need opportunities for training and suitable employment so that they can get back to a normal civilian life.

The Governor's Task Force on Jobs for Veterans is spearheading a "Jobs for Veterans" campaign beginning this month and continuing as long as it takes to find suitable training and employment for these deserving veterans.

Such agencies as the State Divisions of Employment, Vocational Rehabilitation, Veterans' Affairs, and the Federal Veterans' Administration, along with the National Alliance of Businessmen, are all cooperating to make this campaign urging employers to hire veterans a success.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Editor, The Journal:

An inter-community squabble seems to be developing over the possible use of revenue sharing funds to remodel and upgrade the county owned nursing home in Vale. I certainly hope the entire community of Nyssa does not all feel as some of your folks have been voicing.

First, everyone should remember that the Malheur Nursing Home is county owned and operated. It happens to be located in Vale. Its residents are from all over the county. Malheur County has operated a county owned "old folks home" for more years than anyone cares to remember. They have been in the present facility, which was built and donated to the county by Vale area residents, for more than 20 years.

The Nyssa hospital decided to enter the extended care business in 1966. You in Nyssa voted to expand and, of course, are being taxed for this expansion. Remember, it was YOUR choice. The county was already in business and you knew this.

The Malheur Nursing Home is badly in need of repairs. For many years the county has operated it and has not put money back into it for capital improvements. This, coupled with the increasing demands of the State of Oregon and the Federal, has made it imperative that something be done NOW. Revenue sharing, in the amount of \$141,000 seems to be the best possible solution to the problem.

Malheur County is too small and the towns have too much to gain from each other to squabble over revenue sharing money. Besides the \$141,000 is only 5 quarters of a 5 year or 20 quarter planned amount.

We seem to be forgetting the most important thing; providing good nursing home care and a loving home for those in our county that must have extended care. It should make no difference whether they are financially able to pay for their care or if they have to resort to the public paying for their care.

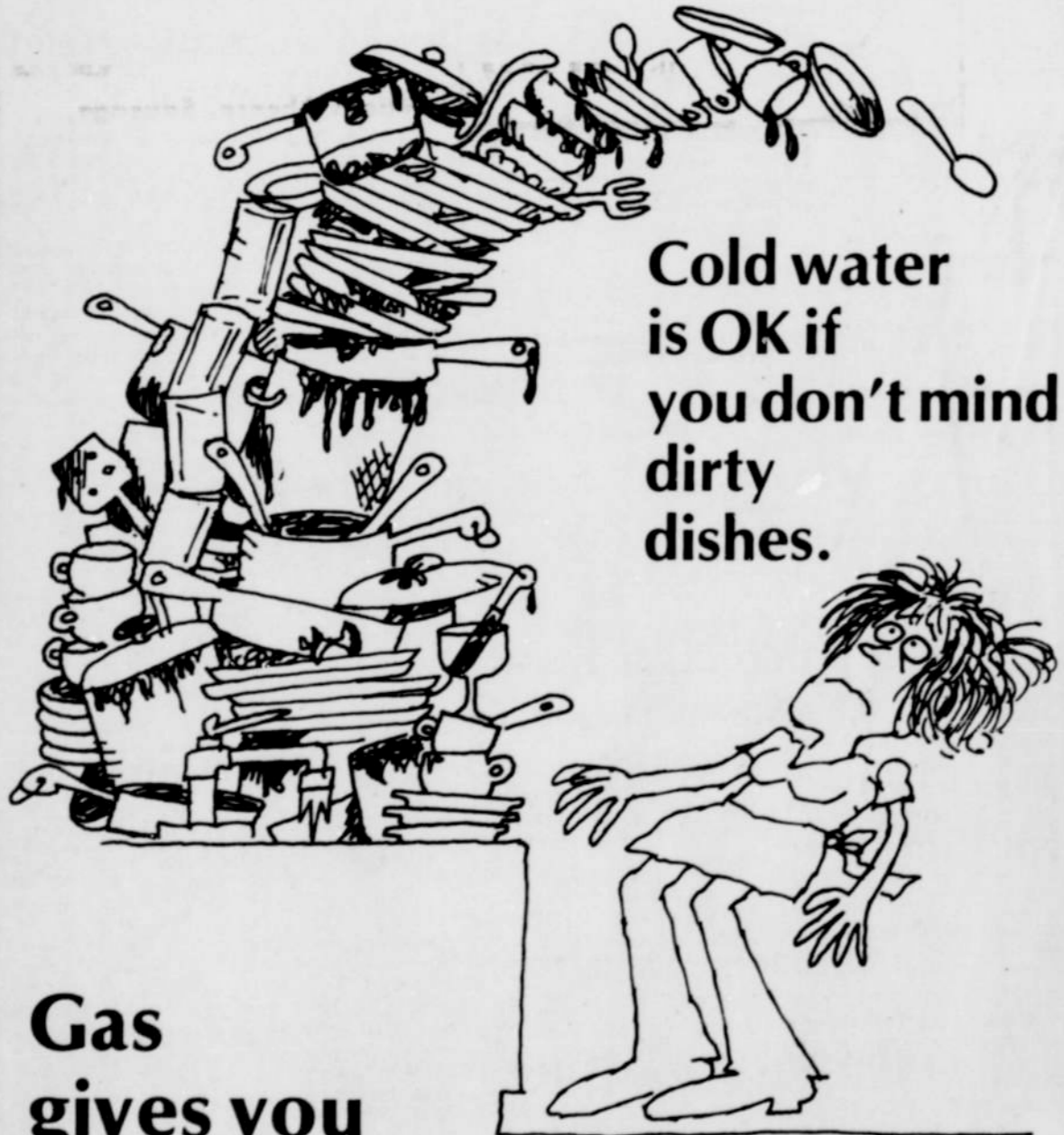

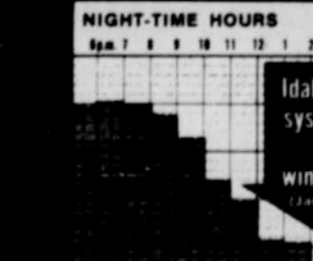
