Herb Sez ...

Well, when you read this I know the Legislature will be well over. This has been an interesting experience—one that has caused me both anguish and joy. We had some bills that I disliked voting "nay" on, but in every instance I voted as I thought the people in my area wanted me to vote.

We had an unpleasant happening which made all of us in the House wonder. Patty McDermott of Pocatello had a recall initiated against her. This recall was based mainly on one vote — the Equal Rights Amendment. She voted against rescinding the action of the Legislature taken last year. Personally, I don't believe it is just or fair to recall a legislator on a one-vote record. I realize that the recall is an important tool in government and must be in the government process, but it can be used wrongly.

This session is amazing—we can pass appropriations dealing with millions without batting an eye and argue for an hour over something that doesn't amount to peanuts.

I may say at this time that you won't have to worry about the 45-day hunting season opening and closing all over the state at the same time. That bill won't come out of Committee.

I carried a House Memorial directed at the Congress, Senate, President, and all concerned, asking them to take it easy classifying any more of Idaho as a wilderness area.

The water channel bill will be voted upon today. It has been amended; most of the objectionable points have been taken care of. However, though no one is completely unhappy with it, no one is entirely pleased.

Today we vote to see if the job corpsmen may purchase a resident fishing license. I think it will be better to let them fish than to raise hell in town every weekend.

This session, like many others, will be known by what it didn't do, rather than by what it did, and really this may be all to the good.

NYSSA PTA MEETING

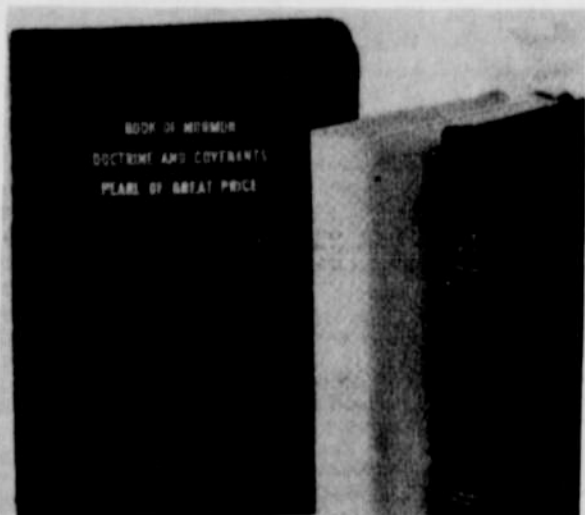
The Nyssa PTA will meet at 8 p.m., Thursday, March 29 instead of the regular third Thursday meeting time.

"Crime" Topic of Lecture

"Crime and Punishment in Malheur Country" is the topic of the sixth lecture in an eight part program sponsored by the Malheur Country Historical Society and Treasure Valley Community College. Speaking from first-hand experiences gained while the district attorney for Malheur County, Charles Swan, now an attorney in Vale, recalls that methods of gathering evidence and apprehending suspected lawbreakers was not as confining as is the case now.

The program will begin at 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 22, in the Weese Memorial Building on the college campus. Swan will talk about many of the interesting cases in which he was involved, such as the Broadhurst case. Anyone interested in this phase of our local history is invited to attend and there is no admission charge.

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
