## Speaking to the Consumer

### CLIMBING FOOTWEAR PRICES

Shoe prices have been climbing faster than other apparel items due to a world-wide shortage of leather. The outlook is for prices to continue this upward trend during the remainder of 1973. Consumers would be wise to look ahead to spring and summer shoe needs, shop carefully, and watch for sales on shoe styles that would carry them through several seasons.

### CHECK YOUR HEALTH POLICY

Approximately one out of every seven Americans was admitted to a hospital last year -- a fact that should serve as a reminder to review your health insurance policy. According to the Source Book of Health Insurance, last year it cost hospitals \$92.31 per patient per day. The average hospital stay per patient was eight days -- a total cost of \$738.48. The Source Book also reports the number of physician visits per person per year averaged 4.6, and the average American had 15 days of medical disability, either restricted to bed or severely limited in his activities.

Evaluate your present policy in terms of these current costs and figures. Will it give you adequate coverage?

### FOOD BUDGET HINT

Grocery shoppers concerned about keeping food bills as low as possible should note that each additional step in processing increases the cost. Take this example: If chicken is cut into parts you may find yourself paying 5 per cent more than for a whole chicken. If parts are already breaded for frying, you can pay 50 per cent more. If the chicken is cooked, ready for the table, you pay 90 per cent or more than for the whole chicken.

### MISLEADING MAIL

Annoyed by mail that looks like a bill but is really just an ad asking you to send money? Help is coming. The U.S. Postal Service has ordered that all mail intended to solicit money but which could be mistaken for a bill carry these words on the envelope: "THIS IS NOT A BILL." On the mail itself, these words must appear in boldface capital letters: "THIS IS A SOLICITATION. YOU ARE UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO PAY UNLESS YOU ACCEPT THIS OFFER."

### YEAR OF AUTO LEGISLATION

People are starting to call this Oregon Legislative year the "year of the auto." These are just some of the consumer-related bills that have been introduced: licensing of auto salesmen and repairmen; prohibiting auto insurance companies from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, marital status or occupation; amending medical benefit and "fault, no-fault" provisions of Oregon's auto insurance law; abolishing deficiency judgments when consumer goods including motor vehicles are repossessed; changing driver's license requirements; and permitting highway money to be spent on mass transit.

### WHAT CAUSES LOWERED GAS MILEAGE?

Are pollution controls lowering the gas mileage that can be expected from current model cars? Yes -- but not any more than the addition of an automatic transmission or an air conditioner, according to a recent governmental study. The single factor in lower mileage per gallon of gasoline is the weight of the auto, a 5,000 pound vehicle requiring twice as much fuel as one weighing 2,500 pounds.

### CHILD-CARE DEDUCTIONS

If you are a working parent, don't overlook deductions for child care when you make out your income tax report. This year you can deduct up to \$400 a month, or \$4,800 a year, if your income is \$18,000 or less. Over \$18,000 the amount is reduced proportionately. To claim these deductions, you must itemize your return and file on the long form 1040. Contact the Internal Revenue Service for specific details and questions.

## Labor Aide Tells Where to Hunt For Jobs

Millions of young people will enter the job market for the first time this summer, an experience that should be regarded as part of their education, according to Herbert Bienstock, Middle Atlantic Regional Director of the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Job experiences teach them the habits and disciplines necessary for future success in the world of work, he said.

Mr. Bienstock suggested that for an answer to finding a job, young people should turn to their school counselors, the classified pages of a newspaper, or to personal contacts. Many companies encourage employees to refer friends for employment, he said.

Another popular type of job-hunting is to call the personnel office of a business to find out what vacancies the company has available. State

employment bureaus and commercial agencies are also places to job hunt. Those who use a commercial service must make sure they understand the terms of employment and any placement fee before accepting a job.

Mr. Bienstock advised students to look into local businesses such as stores, factories, offices, restaurants, or gas stations. Those who want summer jobs away from home might contact the Chamber of Commerce in a resort area or visit local chapters of "Y's" or other organizations sponsoring summer camps that may need camp personnel. When applying for jobs away from home, Mr. Bienstock urged students to consider living expenses. In some summer jobs, living expenses are part of the wages, he said; in others, the employee is responsible for his own room and board.
