

Jerry Kramer Buys Parma Cattle Ranch

Jerry Kramer, ex-Green Bay Packer, has purchased a 500-acre cattle ranch and home near Parma, from Mr. and Mrs. Milton Meyer and will move from California in May.

Kramer, a former University of Idaho grid star and member of Coach Vince Lombardi's championship Green Bay NFL team, and his partner, Roland Williams of Homedale, have also leased land and dairy facilities from Bill Iest.

Kramer and Williams will raise Holstein and Charolais cross. They haven't decided yet whether they will emphasize raising beef or dairying. Jerry and his wife "Wink", a very attractive ex-Mississippi, were welcomed to Parma last Saturday, at an open house at the Meyer residence.

A native of Sandpoint, Idaho, Kramer was the author of three bestselling books about pro football, after his Green Bay Packer career ended. Most famous of the books was "Instant Replay", then came "Winning Is Not The Only Thing", and "Farewell to Football".

Among Kramer's business enterprises is a film production firm in Los Angeles, specializing in sales motivation films for large corporations. He also owns an apartment house in Oklahoma.

In recent years, Kramer has dabbed in broadcasting, doing "color" mike work during pro football games.

The Kramers have a new daughter, nearly three-months old. Jerry's brother, Russ and his family, also plan a move to Parma. They have purchased

the Dan Aranguena farm, located north of Parma.

The Meyers are building a home on their 4,000 acre ranch located at Crane Creek, in Indian Valley, 13 miles out of Cambridge, Idaho.

As a Green Bay guard, Kramer was named All-Pro five times, 1960-63-66-67. He played in the pro bowl in 1963-64-68. During the "Lombardi era", Kramer was a member of the NFL world champions in 1961-62-66-67.

Kramer graduated from the University of Idaho in 1958. His parents still live in Sandpoint where Jerry grew up. Kramer is still listed in the Green Bay record book as co-holder of the Packer's record for the most field goals in one championship game, three, booted in the 1962 clash against the New York Giants.

Herb Sez ...

This session wasn't the longest in history but it was long enough. I was beginning to get weary. The whole thing sort of reminded me of traveling by plane, or by any other means really. I'm always anxious to get started then half way through the journey I'm pleased to know that I still have a long way to go and sort of wish it could go on forever but when nearing the destination I get anxious to get it over with. Then when we get in a holding pattern and go around and around I have the feeling that I'm caught in a trap and fervently wish the whole thing was over and done with.

When I look back on the last 65 days things rather blur in together. I can vividly recall each incident when I bring it to the fore of my thinking, but the whole picture is somewhat a single unit. One of the toughest assignments I had was to serve on the subcommittee for stream bed alteration and lakes. We worked on these bills for many hours the result was a compromise of about 6 different bills.

The point in the stream alteration bill that bugged the environmentalists was the insertion of the economic factor in considering the permit to alter a stream. The preservationists want nothing done to any stream at any time for any reason. The economic factor covers everything for a person putting rip-rap in a stream to protect his property, to building a dam to bring more acres into production. The economic factor also takes into consideration the recreation factors of a stream.

While the stream bill may have its weakness due to the economic factor, the lake bill is a strong bill. We may never get to learn about the usefulness of either one if the Governor vetoes them and this is possible. If he vetoes them we are back to the old bill and I might point out, you will have to get permits to use culverts as well as bridges and it will again be possible to be detained up to 60 days. In the old bill the Water Resources board shall confer with the Department of Fish and Game about all permits. Oh well, we'll see how things turn out when we get to them.

Civic Leader Cited For Harbor Program

John R. Mansell, city manager of Long Beach, Calif., is the 1972 recipient of the Environmental Conservation Distinguished Service Award of the American Institute of Mining, Metallurgical and Petroleum Engineers.

Because of the success of the Long Beach oil development and environmental protection program, the citation given to Mr. Mansell states: "In appreciation for his dedication to the formulation and execution of a successful program uniting the conservation of the environment with the drilling for and production of a major petroleum source in the Long Beach Harbor area."

The Long Beach approach demonstrates that protection of the environment and development of petroleum resources are compatible, according to the Institute. Since the program has been in operation, it said, billions of usable BTU's of petroleum have been produced without problems to the area's ecology.

In a letter to more than 300 public and private schools throughout the state, Senator Weicker offered a half-hour off-the-cuff question and answer period—via telephone amplification equipment—to two different schools each week, beginning in March.

"Without question, our young people should be provided a direct contact with government. Besides providing concerned students a valuable opportunity, the telephone interviews will help give me a better picture of the important concerns of Connecticut's young citizens," Senator Weicker said.

Sectional Postmasters Hold Meeting In Nyssa

The Oregon-Idaho Sectional Center Postmasters gathered at the Eagles Hall in Nyssa for a monthly conference Friday night, March 16. President Lee Dail was host for the meeting and banquet. There were fifty-five postmasters and wives in attendance.

Two other speakers were featured for the evening including Wayne Guyer, Postmaster from Weiser, who told of his recent travels to Post Offices in Idaho, Utah, and Nevada on indoctrination of Hazard Control in regards to Safety Programs recently instituted in all post offices of First Class in the Western Region. New Birds Nest Where Industry Stores Water

The 1,200-acre man-made lake created by Georgia-Pacific Corp. at its tree farm near Crossett, Ark., has developed recreational and natural fringe benefits.

Created for supplemental water supply, the company said that nearly 20,000 visitors used the camping and picnic areas during the past year.

The lake also has attracted thousands of birds. A report issued by the Arkansas Audubon Society says its latest bird census around the lake's perimeter showed the highest count ever for eight different bird species. The first osprey sighting in 50 years was recorded and there was "an encouraging increase" of rare cockleaded woodpeckers. The lake itself is stocked with bass!

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election has been called to be held in the Treasure Valley Community College District on Tuesday, April 3, 1973 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the Treasure Valley Community College District for their approval or rejection a proposed tax levy for the fiscal year 1973-74 in the total amount of \$650,289 to finance, in part, the operating budget previously approved by the Budget Committee of the District.

The ballot title to be submitted to the voters is as follows: **TAX LEVY MEASURE SUBMITTED BY TREASURE VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT** The Treasure Valley Community College District has no tax base, thus requiring voter approval for a tax levy necessary to finance, in part, the operating budget of the district. The district's budget committee approved an operating budget which provides for \$55,244 increase of the 1972-73 operating budget.

That portion of the proposed operating budget to be financed by the levy of local taxes for the tax year 1973-74 is \$650,289 which if approved will be \$28,317 greater than that portion of the operating budget financed by local taxes for the previous year. The Board has calculated that the tax rate per \$1,000 of true cash value, if the levy is approved, shall be \$2.36.

- YES, I VOTE FOR THE TAX LEVY
- NO, I VOTE AGAINST THE TAX LEVY

Registered voters resident within the District 30 days prior to the election shall be entitled to vote. The voters shall place a cross (X) or a check mark (✓) in the box () beside "YES", I vote for the tax levy", or in the box () beside "NO, I vote against the tax levy", whichever shall indicate his choice.

Polling places will be opened at the hour of 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 3, 1973, and will remain open until the hours of 8:00 p.m. local time on that date when the polls will be closed and the vote canvassed.
