CATTLE TOO HIGH?

Cattle too high? Would you believe too cheap? If the price of steers had gone up as fast since 1950 as the price of a first class postage stamp, steers would be bringing \$77 per hundred weight.

If beef prices had increased as much as medical care, steers would be selling at \$72.34 per hundred weight.

If the rise had been as fast as hourly pay, the figure would be \$80.67.

Compared to the cost of having a baby, steers would be bringing \$119.13 per hundred weight.

Compared to the daily cost of hospital service, steers would be \$179.69 per hundred and if that's not enough to curl lassos, the live cattle price in Europe at the beginning of 1973 averaged \$56.00 per hundred weight. Culls and old beef cows ranged from \$46.50 in Holland to \$62 in Italy. All before the last deflation of our dollar.

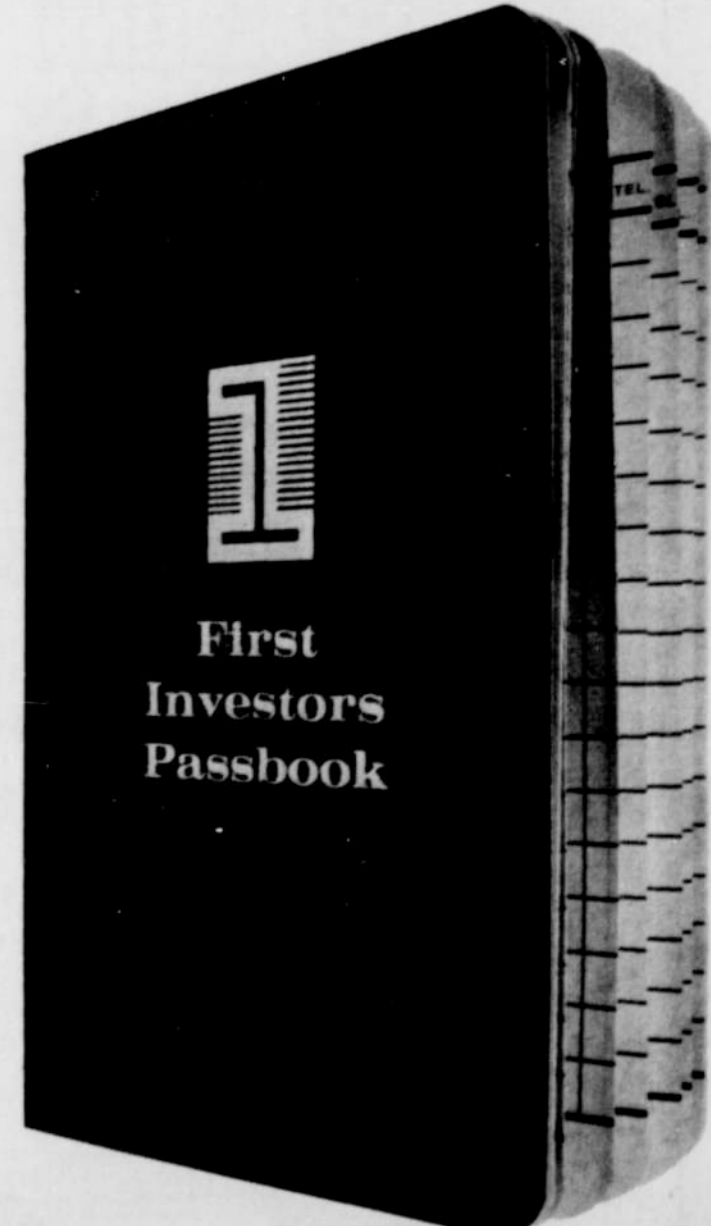
