10 YEARS AGO

The J.R. Simplot Company produce building in Nyssa was completely destroyed by fire Monday night. A company official in Caldwell estimated the loss at about \$100,000 which he said was covered by insurance. Destroyed, other than the building were machinery, 2653 100-pound sacks of seed potatoes a large supply of sacks, some onion seed and other supplies.
