Sagebrush Control To Be Placed On Rangelands

Bids were let this week on chemical sagebrush control on 6,550 acres of privately owned range lands by the Malheur County Range Advisory Committee according to George Bain, Malheur County Extension Agent.

Helicopter application will be by Mountain Air Helicopter for \$1.10 per acre. Chemical will be furnished by Aero Range Service of Lakeview. Their bid was \$4.25 per gallon Butyl ester 24D6# per gallon material and \$4.66 per gallon on low volatile material. These prices are delivered to the communities where the spraying will be done. This results in a total cost to the land owner of \$2.50 per acre where high volatile material can be used and \$2.65 per acre where low volatile material must be used due to nearness to susceptible crops.

It is anticipated spraying will start the last week in April and will be completed by June 1 Bain says. Areas to be sprayed lie from Ironside to Cow Lakes. 7 rom past experience ranchers can expect to double their forage production on treated acreages. By proper management those areas treated will improve in density of native bunch grasses and quality of forage Bain says. So benefits from this program will continue for several years to come.

There have been over 200,000 acres of privately owned sage land treated in this manner since 1968, resulting in an estimated increase of 2,000 animal units months of range feeding, counting those acreages improved by reseeding during that time.
