Student Loan Fund Program

Treasure Valley Community College Financial Aids officer, Gary Halcom, announced today that new legislation affecting the Guaranteed Student Loan pro-

gram went into effect March 1 of this year, which may require earlier application by interested students.

As of March 1 the federal government requires applying students to submit a Parent's Confidential Statement or similar form if the student is solely self-supported. The processing of this form requires additional time which now makes the time between application and receipt of the check about ten weeks.

Students wishing to use the Guaranteed Student Loan program for the fall term of 1973 should make application by June 1. They may contact a local bank or their college financial aids office for the necessary forms.

Herb Sez ...

Let's be fair about it. Is it fair to vent all of our anger about high prices on the cost of a beef steak? I don't own a critter of any kind, not even a cat, therefore, I'm not speaking for myself. Let's put the cause of high prices right where they belong--on the collective backs of congress.

For over 30 years Congress has gone along with every price raise—even during price ceilings. And to make matters worse if some group wasn't doing O.K., they gave it a subsidy. When the price of grain was faltering, the government bought millions of tons to keep the price stable. We had so much stored around the country in warehouses and ships in ports that we had to sell about a billion dollars worth to the one nation that hates us the most—Russia. I doubt if we'll ever get paid for all of it, but at least the price of grain is solid.

For all of these years, the cattleman has had to resist having the government take their free enterprise system from them. They have never been subsidized! The tax payer has never paid a dime's taxes toward the upkeep of the cattle industry. Beef has always been sold on the open market. Sure they get rangeland at a fair price but the majority of the meat served on the table was not produced on rangeland. It was pastured or fed on subsidized feed. Certainly the price of beef is high, perhaps too high, but can you name something that isn't too high?

I can well remember when the price of a hamburger was only 15 to 25 cents, BUT I also remember that I was only making \$27 per week at that time and was one of the better paid people in Caldwell. If the housewife wants to really save money why doesn't she boycott the TV, automobile, camper, or sporting goods companies? It's been claimed for years that tobacco is injurious to health, yet we subsidize the weed. Wouldn't it be smarter to boycott the tobacco stores? Instead we boycott one of the few industries that hasn't had taxpayers help and I haven't noticed the fact mentioned in very many editorials.
