
New Treasure Valley Community College Student Body Association officers for 1973-74 were selected in a campus election April 3.



> These coveted awards, which were initiated in 1923, are based on how well a district performs according to a series of operating standards, which include slicing performance, sugar extraction, sugar quality, fuel consumption, labor expenditures, and the cost of operating supplies over the entire sugar campaign.

> This year, Nyssa operated for 139 consecutive days in processing the sugarbeets from local growers.

The Nyssa district won its first award in 1941 and has now won nine of the bronze plaques, which are displayed in the reception area of the Nyssa factory offices.

The company's Nampa and Twin Falls districts have also won nine of these awards.


