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Big Game Hunters Enjoy Fair 1972 Season

Elk hunters enjoyed a good 1972 season but deer hunters experienced only fair results, according to reports of nimrods responding to the annual hunter questionnaire survey recently completed by the Game Commission.

A capsule summary of the 1972 big game harvest shows that around 320,000 licensed hunters took 73,400 deer, 10,310 elk, 764 antelope, 1,491 black bear, 6 bighorn sheep, and 22 mountain lion. No season was held on mountain goat last year.

John McKean, state game director, said that last year's deer season outlook was not optimistic. Although black-tailed deer numbers had recovered nicely from the severe winter mortality in 1968-69, mule deer numbers were down sharply over most of eastern Oregon, the result of several years of poor fawn production and survival. Best results were predicted on blacktails, with poor hunting predicted on mule deer.

According to hunter reports, about 258,300 nimrods participated in the deer season with 28 percent successful in bagging deer. Hunters took 29,380 mule deer and 44,020 blacktails. About 7,970 of the blacktails were antlerless animals. The total harvest was about 14,000 animals less than the previous year but well below the average over the past 20 years. The reduction was entirely in the take of mule deer while the take of blacktails was up by around 4,000 animals from the previous year.

Good weather conditions provided elk hunters with some fine hunting opportunities during most of the season. They reported taking 10,310 elk,

which is above average for the season. Elk hunting pressure was the highest in history with 79,100 nimrods participating, which actually lowered hunting success to 13 percent. Rocky Mountain elk taken totaled 7,930 animals, about 5,742 of which were bulls. Roosevelt elk totaled 2,380, all but 47 of which were bulls.

Antelope hunters reported an excellent season on these swift desert dwellers. Success among the 1,430 tag holders was 764 pronghorns, for a success ratio of 60 percent.

The black bear season produced 1,491 bruins for just over 8,700 nimrods who reported hunting bear during the season. Archers enjoyed hunting on 17 different management units or areas with the seasons extending for various lengths of time. Just over 11,200 archers participated and reported taking 690 deer and 331 elk.

Bighorn sheep hunters had a good season with 6 three-quarter curl rams taken by the 13 tag holders. Four rams were taken on Hart Mountain and two from the Steens. Cougar hunters also reported good success, with 22 of the big cats taken by 75 tag holders. Most cougar were taken in northeastern Oregon in the Blue and Wallowa mountains.

McKean noted that hunter conduct during the 1972 big game seasons generally was very good although some illegal hunting and vandalism were reported. Hunter cooperation was also excellent, with more and more hunters becoming aware of their responsibilities afield and reporting illegal acts whenever witnessed.

A complete summary of the 1972 big game harvest will be published in the May issue of the Game Bulletin.

Each student will receive individualized training during the evening's activities which will begin at the TVCC arena at 5 p.m. Personal grooming, Western wear styles, modeling, "how to" tips on personal interviews, question and answer sessions, photography sessions and horsemanship are just a few of the categories to be covered.

There will be no charge for the clinic which will be taught by: Helen McGrath, certified horsemanship judge who has judged extensively throughout the Northwest and Canada; Dianne Dealy, former Miss Northwest Rodeo Association Queen; Jennifer Gould, former Miss Rodeo Oregon and for the

past two years a member of the Miss Rodeo America Pageant committee; Rilla Coleman, former rodeo queen and now a leading Treasure Valley Cosmetologist; Linda Turner, reigning Oregon High School Rodeo Queen and winner of the Miss Congeniality Title at the NHRA Finals and also third runner-up in that competition; and Shirley Jennings, Executive Director of the National High School Rodeo Association, chaperone for the NHRA Queen, Miss Rodeo Oregon chaperone, and member of the Miss Rodeo America Pageant Committee for the past four years. Mrs. Jennings also judged the Miss Rodeo U.S.A. competition this past February.

Complete details on all valley rodeo queen competitions will be given, as well as National High School Rodeo, Miss Rodeo American, Miss Rodeo U.S.A., and the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Queen contests. Those attending need not bring horses, as both horses and tack will be supplied during the horsemanship portion of the clinic.
