Idaho Power To Hold Annual Meeting in May

Idaho Power Company announced that its 1973 annual meeting will be held in Ontario May 2 for the convenience of the utility's shareowners in the Ontario-Payette area.

The meeting will take place at the East Side Cafe, beginning

at 2:30 p.m., according to G.E. McBroom, western division manager with headquarters at Payette.

McBroom said Ontario was selected as the site for this year's meeting to "make it possible for Idaho Power shareowners in the eastern Oregon and western Idaho portion of our service area to take a direct part in the affairs of their company."

Of some 3,330 Idaho Power shareowners in the utility's operating territory, about 385 live in the western division centered on Ontario and Payette.

Idaho Power has rotated the annual meetings in recent years among its four operating divisions--western, central, southern and eastern.

McBroom said the purpose of the meeting is to elect the company's board of directors and transact other business requiring shareowner action.

Company president Albert Carlsen will report to the shareowners on the company's operations in 1972--when new records were set in total energy use, average domestic customer use and operating costs--

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
