Antelope Filing Deadline Near

Big game hunters interested in the 1973 antelope season are reminded that only a few more days are left to file applications for tags if they wish to be included in the drawings.

The cutoff date for accepting applications is Tuesday, May 1. Applications received after 5 p.m. on that date will not be considered unless surplus tags remain following the public drawing. Since interest in antelope hunting is high, it is unlikely that any surplus tags will be available. The public drawing is scheduled at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters at 10 a.m., May 11.

The 1973 antelope hunting regulations are available at all license dealers. Complete instructions on filing and drawing procedures are contained in the synopsis.

Draft Registration Still Required For Young Men

REMEMBER—The Law Still Requires You To Register For The Draft At Age 18.

There seems to be some question among the male citizens and their parents regarding whether or not young men are still required to register when they reach the age of 18 years. This has been noted especially since the announce-ment that there will be no in-duction calls for the months of March through June. Apparently there has been some misunder-standing of former Secretary Laird's statement.

The law still requires any male person to register within 30 days of his 18th birthday - from 30 days before to 30 days after the day. Failure to do so is a violation of law, making the young man subject to referral to the U. S. Attorney for prosecution.

The registrant is required to bring verification of date of birth with him when he comes to register, preferably a birth certificate or birth registra-

tion card. A driver's license can be used if the above are not available.

It is anticipated that Congress will not extend the right to in-duct June 30, which is the ex-piration date of the present authority. However, young men MUST CONTINUE to register.

Persons may register at the Office of Local Board Nos. 21 and 22, 368 SW 5th Avenue, On-tario or with registrars in va-rious locations in the county. The Selective Service System Office is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

Some 600 farmers, ranchers, businessmen, young people, agricultural leaders and guests are expected to attend the first Malheur County "TOPOP" tour on May 19, according to Ray Novotny, County Extension Agent. The Agent, went on to say, with Malheur's wide and varied agricultural diversity, people from all sectors will have an opportunity to know more about its agriculture, its people and the communities we live in.

Visits will include the Mal-heur Experiment Station to re-view alfalfa hay production, chemical weed control, vari-eties and fertility require-ments for maximum production. Novotny went on to say with 63,000 acres of alfalfa and 40,000 acres of irrigated pasture the Harry Featherston farm, visitation at Vale, de-monstrates maximum pasture production management along with quality beef production.

The delegation will then visit the "Scotty" Joe Payne dairy

enterprise near Vale and learn more about the dairy industry and its significance to Ore-gon's economy.

The noon stop at Willowcreek will be highlighted by a free steak barbecue, supported by local business, civic groups, farm and ranch organizations. A demonstration of unified ef-forts of all segments working together in support of this ac-tivity, Novotny stated.

4-H Livestock and horse ac-tivities plus "TOPOP" enter-tainment will complete the noontime activities.

The group will then travel to the Marvin Young cattle feed-lot, followed by a visit of the beautiful Emil and Helen Maag farm home plus emphasis on sugarbeets and field corn pro-duction.

The last stop according to Novotny will be highlighted by Benny Maag's wheat, alfalfa hay and feedlot enterprises. Full details of the tour will be coming soon Novotny con-cluded.

PROVIDING VITAL SUPPLIES OF NATURAL GAS to the 6.2 million people of Washington, Oregon and Idaho is this 4,000-mile network of steel pipeline stretching from New Mexico to the Canadian border. This energy transmission system is the heart of the new Northwest Pipeline Company, an independent publicly-held company being developed as a result of recent court decisions.

The Northwest Pipeline system is unique in having gas supplies on both ends of its line and large potential reserves along its route through the Rocky Mountain basin.

The new management team put together by the APCO Group (Alaska Interstate Com-pany, Apco Oil Corporation, Gulf Interstate Company and Tipperary Land & Exploration Corporation) has committed itself to spending \$25 million over the next five years on an aggressive gas exploration program to expand further its ability to serve North-west customers.

Procedures for creating the new com-pany and obtaining an operating certificate from the Federal Power Commission could be completed as early as this summer, according to John G. McMillian, President-designate of Northwest Pipeline.

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
