

In the photo at right Ralph Lowe, water superintendent and Dean Winchester are shown installing a length of 10 inch pipe which will connect the new well into the system with the two existing wells. When this job is completed a pump house will be constructed over the new well.

Koch said that this is the first phase of major water system improvements planned for Nyssa. Later a booster pump and proposed 3,000,000 gallon storage facilities will be submitted for approval by Nyssa citizens.


