Salem Scene

True to tradition, bi-partisan minority is making its presence felt during the current session of the Legislature in Salem.

That minority is the dwindling band of lawmakers whose constituents populate more than half the state's 36 counties and as much as three-fourths of its land area. Comprising one-sixth of the 90 men and women serving this session, the five Senators and ten Representatives that make up this minority are best known as the Eastern Oregon delegation.

They are the Legislators who travel the greatest distance to deliberate in Salem. And though they seldom commute between the Capital City and their homes once the session starts, they're probably better known back home than their Western Oregon counterparts.

Because of the special demands of their minority status, they often emerge from a session among the best known statewide.

Lawmakers from the so-called sunny side of the mountains tend to have several things in common. There is an all-male contingent. Each tends to remain in office as long as he desires to serve. And, often as not, they tend to win nomination by both parties at election time.

The Eastern Oregon Legislator doesn't necessarily come to Salem with a chip on his shoulder. But his attitude reflects an offense calculated to camouflage what is traditionally a defensive stance.

The combination of factors motivating him to seek office in the first place and to remain in office second, quite often propels him to positions of leadership—sometimes implied and other times official.

This tendency toward leadership evolves from a man-among-men situation and has little to do with politics. Eastern Oregon lawmakers quite often become Senate Presidents and Speakers of the House. But they seldom attain the office of governor, no matter how much legislative power they acquire.

His minority status is particularly galling to the Eastern Oregon Legislator—who may represent an area larger than several states. But the one-man-one-vote principle means the disparity between numbers of Legislators from east and west of the mountains will continue as long as the population congregates in the west.

Multnomah county, one of the smallest in land area, sends eight Senators and sixteen Representatives to Salem.

It is obvious then, that if east-of-the-mountain lawmakers want something special for their constituents, they just about have to present a solid front. And they have to be particularly persuasive.

Historically, one would have to say this minority has been effective. It has helped achieve many concessions for Eastern Oregon—although some also favor residents of rural Western Oregon, too. Most concessions involve land and are granted in the form of deferrals, assessment methods and exemptions.

But other exceptions often are won—such as the one-time exemption from daylight time for Ontario and the present session is considering a bill that would provide some sort of bonus for medical doctors willing to practice east of the mountains.

Even a cursory knowledge of Eastern Oregon makes plain the special treatment its residents seek at Salem. Tied almost irrevocably to a rural economy, its people are influenced greatly by two factors over which they have no control. The first is weather—essential to their crops and livestock. And the second is the price their products bring in the marketplace.

As with most rural populations these factors tend to produce people quite different from those who live in urban regions. They tend to favor things the way they are—especially when it comes to government. And if they can't keep government the way it is, then they'd just as soon have less of it.

Solid opposition to the McCall school tax proposal is a case in point this session. One Eastern Oregon county trounced it more soundly than any before in the memory of old-timers. Regional governmental concepts haven't met with much success east of the mountains. Zoning also is about as popular as a fence on open rangeland.

Environmental issues aren't nearly as popular because the wide open spaces abound and look like they'll last forever. Attempts to discourage immigration of new people and industry are particularly difficult for the east-Oregonian to accept.

He has spent his lifetime watching young people grow up and leave for lucrative jobs elsewhere. He has seen employment decline and knows technological progress is all that manages to preserve his economic status quo. And he sorely resents the attitude of some outsiders—that Eastern Oregon is important mostly as an outdoor playground for the Willamette Valley and California. His feelings reach a boiling point on occasion. Such as the time Walla Walla County threatened

One might say Eastern Oregon lawmakers are that tempering ingredient of the legislative steel forged every two years in Salem.
